NOVA SCOTIA RECYCLES CONTEST

This school-based initiative offers over \$55,000 in cash, prizes and scholarships to students and their schools. The contest is open to students from grades primary to twelve and includes design contests, video categories, as well as a research essay contest for grade twelve students.

Contest packages and guidelines will be available on RRFB Nova Scotia's website in late September. Early bird entries are due by December 14th and the final deadline for the contest is February 9th. PUT WASTE IN ITS PLACE

RRFB Nova Scotia is ramping up for a large fall campaign that will ask Nova Scotians to **Put Waste In Its Place**. Sure, we think we're doing a good job recycling and composting, but a recent audit of the seven landfills

in our province showed that over 50% of what was received as garbage could have been either recycled or composted.



Put Waste In Its Place will encourage residents to work just a little harder to sort their waste at home, at work, and at play. The campaign will focus on organics and paper, since although these waste types are readily recyclable, they were the leading offenders in the waste audit.

The campaign will include a new website, a facebook page, and an online social media component. The Put Waste in Its Place theme will be incorporated into all of RRFB Nova Scotia's communication and education initiatives in the upcoming year.

CLEAN ACROSS NOVA SCOTIA/ THE GREAT N.S. PICK-ME-UP THE POWER OF COLLECTIVE ACTION



In the spring of 1992, Clean Nova Scotia coordinated the first official Great Nova Scotia Pick Me Up. Today, more than 10,000 Nova Scotians participate annually in the initiative, and many no doubt do their part quietly, without fanfare and recognition. Ironically, the people who do the most are often the ones we hear about the least. For all of you out there, Thank You!

We know that cleanups are about much more than picking up litter, and people have many reasons for participating. As Kelly Barbara Schnare reminds us, "the idea that one good deed deserves another remains a cyclical building block for community." (Schnare, K.B., (2011). *Motivations of environmental volunteers: A cross cultural comparison.*)

Even people who have little interest in picking up litter often realize that cleanups are a fantastic opportunity to meet our neighbours, and reassert our desire to be in community together.

Taken together, this represents the core of why we think Clean Across Nova Scotia (www.cleanacrossns.ca) is important. By recognizing and weaving together those "who have positive values, altruistic and unselfish ideas" (Schnare, 2011) under a common cause, we begin to find consensus around the idea that we all need to care a bit more, together. Acting alone is admirable, but acting together is powerful.

By June 8 of 2012, we had already equaled the number of registered cleaners as we had in all of 2011. As part of World Cleanup 2012, which has brought together nearly 100 countries to do the same, all those admirable actions are truly becoming something powerful.

Thank you so much for starting this. I will do my very best to continue the work!

2012 Spring Cleanup Totals



The Spring 2012 cleanup was an <u>incredible</u> success, with 115 groups taking part. A total of 3682 bags of garbage and 231 bags of recyclables were removed from 689 kilometers of highway (that's the distance from Yarmouth to Sydney!) and 6

highway interchanges. We were very fortunate to have 1,703 volunteers take part, who donated 4,932 hours of their time.

These totals mean that <u>over 58 tonnes</u>, (58.7 tonnes to be exact) of garbage and recyclables were removed for our highways this spring. We're very pleased to have such outstanding volunteers who work together to achieve this phenomenal total.

PROMOTIONAL ITEMS - We have a selection of promotional items that are available for our volunteers after they have completed their litter cleanup. We have tape measures, bandage dispensers (which contain 5 bandages), refillable pocket hand sanitizers, pens, reusable bags (supplied by NS Environment), litter bags, (donated by RRFB Nova Scotia), and window decals. If you would like any of these items, please let us know when you send in your completed litter permit.

V.I.P. – VERY IMPORTANT PERMIT- The Litter Cleanup Permit is <u>very important</u> to our office and the Adopt-A-Highway program. All groups should have a permit on hand during the cleanup. It gives them permission to perform a cleanup along the roadway. After the cleanup, please send a copy of the permit to our office so we know that your group has completed your roadside litter cleanup. The data on the permit (number of volunteers, time spent on cleanup, amount of garbage, etc.) is essential for our program.
