UPDATES FROM OUR ADOPT-A-HIGHWAY GROUPS

SALT SPRINGS 4-H CLUB



The Salt Springs 4-H Club in Pictou County, has been participating in annual highway clean ups for a number of years. They cover a 5 kilometre stretch of Highway #4, in the Salt Springs area. Some of the things they found this year were: 6 deer carcasses, family of tadpoles, car parts, tires, blown up tires, hard hat, oil jugs, diapers - both baby and adult; along with the usual beer bottles, pop cans, and coffee cups. There weren't too many interesting finds this year, however, the carpool parking lot on Exit #19 is still holding its reputation as the place with the most weird items.



TEXTILE RECYCLING

Recycling your old clothes and household textiles is a great way to reduce the amount of material that goes to the landfill. People often donate their unwanted clothing to the "second hand" stores or local charities. They may not know that you can also donate clothes that are ripped, stained, or worn out. These can be made into rags, or reprocessed back into fibers. The partners in this program have a very informative and helpful website: www.afterwear.ca/wp. You can donate clothing, footwear, accessories, curtains, tablecloths and stuffed toys. The Association for Textile Recycling (AfTeR) include Big Brothers Big Sisters, The Salvation Army, Value Village, Canadian Diabetes Foundation,



Canadian Red Cross, Canadian Breast Cancer Foundations, and the Enviro-Depots. Donating is also a great way to help out these very worthy charities. Their website also has a map of drop off locations across the province.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION:

-All volunteers are eligible to receive various Adopt-A-Highway **promotional items** for carrying out their roadside cleanup! Groups can request these items when they send in their completed Litter

Cleanup Permit. We have refillable pocket hand sanitizers, tape measures, bandage dispensers, pens, and window decals. A new item we have this Fall is <u>thermal</u> <u>lunch bags</u>. We thought that our volunteers would enjoy this item, and would be happy to send some out for your hardworking participants.

It is a great opportunity for our volunteers to attend a session in their local area, if they are not inclined to travel. If you would like to host our V.I.S., send a proposal including a venue, caterer, cost estimates, and a possible tour site/idea. We will decide on the location for our 2015 V.I.S. in late January.

FALL CLEANUP PREPARATIONS

Now that summer will be coming an end, it's time to start thinking about your upcoming Fall cleanup.

Here is a check list of items to help you prepare.

- \checkmark Discuss with your group the best day to perform the cleanup.
- Request an Adopt-A-Highway Program Cleanup permit at least one week before your cleanup from the local TIR depot (or HRM office). They will arrange to have the supplies ready for your group.
- ✓ On the day of the cleanup, review the safety guidelines with all members of your volunteer group (as the Weymouth Lions Branch Club is doing here).



- ✓ Fill out the information on the Litter Cleanup Permit after your cleanup. Keep a copy of the permit for your records, give the Department of TIR depot a copy and send a copy to the Adopt-A-Highway office.
- Return the department vests and unused garbage bags, etc. to the TIR depot in the next day or two.

2014 Spring Cleanup Totals

The Spring 2014 cleanup was an amazing event, with 99 groups taking part. A total of 3,130 bags of garbage and 199 bags of recyclables were removed from 578 kilometers of highway and 6 highway interchanges. Over 1,450 volunteers carried out these many roadside cleanups for 4,052 total hours. All together, almost <u>50 tonnes</u> of garbage and recyclables were picked up from our highways this Spring. The public is very appreciative of the time and effort that our volunteers give to improve the appearance of our surrounding areas. <u>Thank You!!</u>

We also heard from several groups that they had made plans for their cleanup, but had to cancel because of wet conditions or inclement weather. Hopefully things will work out for their next scheduled event.

THE GREAT NOVA SCOTIA PICK-ME-UP

The Great Nova Scotia Pick-Me-Up (GNSPMU or PMU) is Nova Scotia's primary volunteer-driven litter abatement program, facilitating year-round, communitydriven clean-ups across the province. 'Clean' (formerly known as Clean Nova Scotia) coordinated the first PMU event in the spring of 1992, and since that time the program has evolved into one of Nova Scotia's largest volunteer environmental events.

They support cleanups all year long and kicked off

the 2014 cleanup season with a month long campaign during the month of April. In partnership with the Portland Estates &



Hills Residents Association, 'Clean' launched their Great Nova Scotia Pick Me Up program. This photo shows some keen volunteers who helped with the Portland Estates event!

'Clean' have had great results so far. As of the end of July, they had assisted in 269 cleanups across the province involving 18,771 participants. They estimate that their groups have collected almost 7,000 bags of litter and 668 bags of recyclables!

You are welcome to choose any cleanup location you like. This can include shoreline, parks, a school, or any outdoor space that you value.

UNUSUAL FINDS

RRFB Nova Scotia Report RECYCLES CONTEST



Each year RRFB Nova Scotia hosts the Nova Scotia Recycles Contest for students in grades Primary to 12. Students throughout the province participate in colouring and design contests, a video challenge and an essay competition for a chance to win more than \$55,000 in cash, prizes and scholarships. The contest provides an oppor-

tunity for students to actively promote recycling and composting in their community and celebrate the important role Nova Scotia youth play in making our province a recognized leader in waste reduction.

This year, they received over 6,700 entries from 201 schools, such as this entry for the whiteboard design from a student at Ferrisview Elementary in North Sydney. MOBIUS AWARDS OF ENVIRONMENTAL EXCELLENCE

This fall, RRFB Nova Scotia will host the 16th annual Mobius Awards of Environmental Excellence. The awards recognize the achievements of Nova Scotia organizations and individuals who help make our province a leader in waste reduction, recycling and composting.

- Innovation in Waste Reduction

An example of a winner from 2013 is Best Community-Based Project: Scotsburn Pork Chop BBQ. This category is important because at the heart of all our work is the drive to keep our community beautiful, vibrant, and a wonderful place to live. This popular event raises funds for the volunteer fire department to purchase equipment. Even though they served over 1,900 meals this year, they only produced three bags of garbage. Among other improvements, they repainted old signs, provided sorting instructions, composted during preparation, and collected refundables. Not only is this group of volunteer fire fighters protecting us, they are protecting the environment.

LITTER PICK - UP TOOLS

Some groups are interested in the various litter pick up tools that may be available for use. There are some that can be purchased at local dollar stores for a minimal costs. There are also options at hardware stores and auto supply stores. Bill Alexander, from the Alexander Family AAH group in Stanley Section, makes his own litter pick up tool. He has kindly agreed to share the instructions

with other groups.

Pattern for Litter Pick-Up Sticks:

The litter pick up sticks can be made from 3/4" clear pine.

1. Cut a strip that is $1 \frac{1}{4''}$ wide. A length of 4 feet long is popular.

2. Put a 3" finish nail, 1" from the end through the 1 1/4 " thickness.

3. Round the corners on the other end for 2 to 3 feet.

You can pick up cans and bottles with small openings with these sticks, along with other litter. Bill also suggests that a 20 liter plastic bucket (he likes the square ones) is best with the sticks, as you can tap the bucket to get the litter off.


