We were the only Canadians attending the Conference.


While at the Conference we learned what other Adopt-A-Highway Programs are doing to rid litter from their Province/State.

Litter Clean Up in Progress Sign

Litter Clean Up in Progress signs are being developed for Adopt-A-Highway groups to use during their clean up. These signs should be ready in time for your Fall clean up. Groups should request these signs when they call for their cleanup permit, garbage bags, etc., from the Department of Transportation and Public Works in your clean up area. Two signs will be available - one to be placed at the beginning of your clean up and the other to be placed at the end of your clean up, near your Adopt-A-Highway sign.

The 'Men Working' signs are no longer available for the Adopt-A-Highway groups to use.

Adopt-A-Highway Volunteer Coordinator Information/Recognition Session

The Information/Recognition Session held on Saturday, March 20, 2004, was a great success!

The session was held at AgriTECH Park in Truro. Forty volunteers attended the session, travelling from Yarmouth, New Glasgow, Antigonish, Halifax, Amherst, and many points in between.

The day included presentations by the Department of Transportation and Public Works and two of the three founding members of the Program, Women's Institutes of Nova Scotia and the Lions Clubs of Nova Scotia. Clean Nova Scotia was unable to attend the session.

Topics included safety procedures, tips for a successful cleanup, litter laws (a presentation by the Department of Environment and Labour) and volunteerism - motivating volunteers. An Information package on recycling was given to the volunteers.

Each volunteer gave a report on their group's cleanup effort and all enjoyed a wonderful lunch.

During the afternoon break, Craig White from Cobequid Physiotherapy joined the volunteers to demonstrate some stretches to do before and after their cleanup.

The volunteers were presented with a certificate for their participation in the Session.

It was a fun and informative day for all!

Observations Made During the 1st Enfield Scouts Fall, 2003 Clean up



The 1st Enfield Scouts and Venturers collected six bags of recyclables and 128 bags of garbage and general debris - 420kg in all, during their Fall, 2003 clean up. Eleven volunteers took part in the clean up.

Some light observations made as a result of the clean up by the Scouts and Leader are as follows:

- Patrons of McDonald's restaurants always travel in pairs (always found two of a debris item, cups/french fry containers, etc.).
- ► Players Light smokers out number other brands by 2 to 1.
- Many smokers drink coffee (cigarette packages always found near coffee cups)
- Coffee drinkers travel farther before tossing cups than cold drink consumers (based on distance from originating location).
- Drink container tops and bottoms exit vehicles at different times/locations.
- Most food eaters/plate tossers find utensils in vehicle after they have thrown out the dishes (forks and knives not found near plates).
- ► Utensils travel in mass quantities (forks and knives found in multiples).

Nova Scotia Adopt-A-Highway Program Safety & Clean Up Tips

Hazardous and Large Items to Flag:

- Medical Waste needles, urine bottles
- Corrosive Waste car batteries
- Animal Carcasses
- ♦ Heavy Items

Appropriate clothing and supplies:

- Wear CSA approved boots and safety hat, long sleeve shirts and pants, gloves, and of course a CSA approved safety vest.
- Use sunblock
- Drink lots of water or fruit juice
- ♦ Bug repellent

Parking on the shoulders of the highway or on Exit ramps is not permitted.

Arrange to shuttle volunteers to clean up site.

Prohibited:

- Volunteers must not have in their possession, or consume illegal drugs or alcoholic beverages immediately before or during clean up activities.
- ♦ Do not use personal music devices during clean up.
- No pets shall be present during clean up.

Lost and Found:

♦ If items of value are found, surrender them to the group representative, who in turn will surrender to the nearest police station

General Tips:

- Never compress litter in a garbage bag with your foot or hand.
- Don't fill garbage bags too full or make them too heavy. They will be hard to tie and carry.
- Use a rake to gather litter.
- Use a plastic ring to hold garbage bag open.
- Any recyclable material found, such as beverage containers, can be claimed by the group to raise funds.
- Remember to send a copy of your completed permit to the Adopt-A-Highway office after each clean up.
- Return all unused supplies to Transportation and Public Works.

Promotion:

- ♦ *Litterature* Newsletter circulate to volunteers in group
- ♦ Brochures available upon request
- Invite the media to take part in clean ups or to cover the event
- Encourage local businesses to support your volunteer work
- Encourage volunteers to enter Adopt-A-Highway contests

Fall 2003 Clean Up Report

Forty seven groups participated in a Fall clean up. A total of 1152 bags of garbage and 77 bags of recyclables were removed from 277.4 kilometres of highway by six hundred and thirty eight volunteers.

Hurricane Juan seemed to have an impact on the Fall clean up effort. Many trees were down along the roadsides making it unsafe for volunteers to complete their clean up.

We have four 100 Series Highway Interchanges adopted and many more waiting to be adopted. Thousands of kilometres of secondary highway are still waiting to be adopted.

If you know a group, business in your area who you think may be interested in adopting a section of highway, please let us know and we would be happy to send them some information on the program. Challenge another group to adopt a section of highway!

Thank you to all volunteers who participate in the Adopt-A-Highway Program - without you, there wouldn't be an Adopt-A-Highway Program.

The Adopt-A-Highway Program is able to continue due to the support of our volunteer groups and also from the continued support
