Adopt-A-Highway Volunteer Information Session 2008



About 40 volunteers and representatives gathered at AgriTech Park in Bible Hill for the fifth annual Adopt-A-Highway Volunteer Information Session on April 12th



Jeff MacCallum, Director, Programs & Business Development with the RRFB Nova Scotia, gave a presentation on RRFB Nova Scotia helping Nova Scotians Reduce Waste. Jeff informed the volunteers about the many programs offered through the RRFB. In 2008, there are seven landfills that are

regulated. The newest program is the Electronics Recycling Program. There are about thirty ACES drop-off centers. Atlantic Canada Electronics Stewardship (ACES)

The group went on a tour to the Colchester County Balefill Facility in Kemptown. The County has now become a leader in the management of solid waste issues. This facility was the first permitted "second generation" landfill in Nova Scotia and has a life expectancy of about 70 years.



We met J. P. Wood, the Balefill's Waste Management Officer. JP told the group that composting is nature's way of recycling organic matter and nutrients back into the soil for use by new and growing plants. Food scraps, yard waste and

other organic materials are broken down with the help of micro-organisms and turned into compost, a rich soil amendment. Colchester County promotes 2 types of composting: curbside composting and backyard composting. Both types of composting help to extend the life of landfills, decrease greenhouse gas emissions, protect groundwater and streams, and turn waste into a valuable resource. He gave information to the volunteers about the facility, and then the group got on the bus and did a tour of the grounds at this facility.



Helen Smith, Program
Coordinator of the Nova Scotia
Youth Conservation Corps,
told the group of Volunteers
that this program works
closely with community
partners and youth across
Nova Scotia. Their aims are to
increase environmental
awareness and create
leadership opportunities for the

Microsoft Streets and Trips Map, to plot the sections of highways and exits. She gave a demonstration on how she uses the software from the information that is on the application.





Fall 2007 Clean-Up Report

Thank you to all groups and individuals that participated in the Fall 2004 Clean-ups. Please ensure a copy of your permit is sent to the Adopt-A-Highway office. The permit gives the office important information such as number of volunteers, number of hours spent on the clean-up, number of bags of garbage, etc. If a permit is not received, the office has no official confirmation of a clean-up.

The Grand Total – Fall 2007:

A grand total of 672 bags of garbage and recyclables were collected during the Fall 2004 clean-ups.





findings, so therefore the number of bags would be larger in number. It is important that you send your permit to the office, as it helps with the funding for the program.

Total amount of kilometers cleaned was 170.5 along with five Interchange/Exit areas. A total of 467 volunteers donated a grand total of 1011 volunteers hours.

The total weight of the garbage collected is 10 080 pounds. This equals 9.98 tonnes of garbage and recyclables collected from Nova Scotia's highways.
