



Nova Scotia's Adopt-A-Highway Program

Spring 2012

FALL 2011 IN REVIEW



We would like to thank the fortyfive groups across the province who participated in the fall cleanup last year. A grand total of 893 bags of garbage and recyclables were eliminated from our highways.

They covered 228 kilometers of roadsides and one exit of Nova Scotia highways. The material removed is equal to 13.4 tonnes. We were fortunate to have 439 volunteers generously give their time (1158 hours to be exact!) to achieve this remarkable event. The weather was unpredictable last fall, and we were appreciative that so many groups were able to get out and improve the appearance of their communities.

The total for the year is over 73 tonnes of garbage and recyclables (4866 bags) collected from 897 kilometres of road ways and 7 interchanges by over 2,000 volunteers. Well done!

MAHONE BAY & AREA LIONS FACE BIG CLEANUP!



On a beautiful morning in October, eight Lion members and six volunteers from the community headed out to clean a section of Highway #3 near Mahone Bay. Soon they were on their way with highway vests, buckets, and garbage bags. By 11:00, most were finished except for the carpool parking lot where volunteers had started, but could not finish. Others came along to help and before long had most of the mess cleaned up that was visible from the lot. Lion Gary's trailer was over flowing at that point. In total, 60 bags of garbage was collected, 141 recyclables, 12 tires, and a large coil of cable, along with various appliances and ceiling lights. They would like to thank all the volunteers for their efforts on this project.

FABLES CLUB JOINS AAH

Fables Club is a new group on the Sunrise Trail (Hwy #6) near Tatamagouche. The clubs' owners were dissatisfied by the amount of garbage that was in the ditches along the road, and decided to join our program. Between their spring and fall cleanups they have picked up over 60 bags of litter. They feel that having clean highways is important for the community, and also for the tourism industry. They believe that tourists will be more likely to return if a community is clean and free from litter.



2ND WELLINGTON SCOUTING HAVE INTERESTING FINDS



2nd Wellington Scouting held their fall clean-up on the #12 Highway from Wellington to Grand Lake in late September. They had a good turnout with 30 volunteers (combination of youth and adults) working together to collect 18 bags of garbage and 6 bags of recyclables. They had many unusual finds including some blue hair, a duvet, a surgical mask and the youth were interested in an entire hollowed out deer carcass. They also found love letters which made for interesting reading, and a

pair of bloomers which seem to be a standard find for their cleanups. They did a Tim Hortons' cup count which is down to 206 (was 429 in the spring, and 387 last fall). They also counted 98 McDonald's cups. They received hand sanitizers and reusable bags from our program as a "Thank You" for all their hard work.

BASINVIEW ANIMAL HOSPITAL HELP TO CLEAN UP IN BEDFORD

Basinview Animal Hospital has recently adopted a section of Hammonds Plains Road in Bedford. They carried out their first cleanup this fall and reported that it was a great success and the weather was perfect. They had 11 volunteers and picked up 12 bags of garbage - only took them 2 hours to complete. They really enjoyed doing it. They said it was unbelievable how many people stopped them to say positive things. HRM was able to pick up their bags at 2:00 pm at their clinic location – They love it when a plan comes together! Dr. Yvonne took the volunteers out to brunch for a job well done. They are already looking forward to the spring clean-up.



HAPPY BIRTHDAY TO US! AAH Turns 20 years old!

The Adopt-A-Highway Program began in Nova Scotia in 1992 when the Women's Institutes of Nova Scotia, Lions Clubs of Nova Scotia and Clean Nova Scotia met with the



Department of Transportation and Public Works to discuss a common interest. That common interest was "How do we combat litter along Nova Scotia's highways?"

A pilot project began in 1993 with 18 groups in various areas. In 1997 the official launch of the Nova Scotia Adopt-A-Highway Program was held in Port Williams. The program had spread across the province with 22 groups involved. In the spring cleanup, 705 bags of garbage were collected with 137 km of roadways adopted. Also, Halifax Regional Municipality became involved in the program this year.

In 1998 we fulfilled an old saying when one group actually found a kitchen sink on their cleanup. Other unusual finds were a frozen turkey and a cell phone. The program grew quickly and in 1999, 98 groups were registered with the program. A new Litter Cleanup Permit was introduced the same year to make the recording of information easier.

The volunteer groups in 2001 outperformed any other year. We had 143 volunteer groups (nearly 1900 volunteers) that worked together to remove almost 6200 bags of litter removed from our roadways for the year (that's 92 tonnes!)

In the years 2000, 2003 and 2007, representatives from our program attended the International AAH conference in the United States. In 2000 it was held in Phoenix Arizona, in 2003, Charleston, West Virginia hosted and in 2007 it took place in Nashville Tennessee. The conferences were very worthwhile, and the attendees came away with many new ideas to incorporate into the N.S. AAH program.

In 2002 we distributed litter bags and bookmarks across the province. In November, the program expanded to include a three year pilot project on the 100 Series Highway Interchanges. In Spring of 2003 the first interchange adopted was Exit 9 of Hwy #102 at Elmsdale . Volunteers collected 90 bags of litter and other items. To date we have eight groups who have adopted an Interchange/Exit.

Also in 2002 the Litter Sweep Contest was introduced with Hub Campers sending in the most unusual finds, with a collection of rubber boots, a chair and a whiskey bottle. Hopewell 4-H Club and R.J.'s Community Groups placed second and third respectively. May 4th was also proclaimed AAH Day in Nova Scotia for the first time this year.

Forty people attended the first Volunteer Coordinator Information / Recognition Session that was held in March at Agri-Tech Park in Bible Hill. New "Litter Cleanup in Progress" signs were introduced during the Fall Cleanups to help the visibility of our groups during their litter pickup.

In 2004, winners of our Litter Sweep Photo Contest were the Salt Springs 4-H Club, who had found an envelope containing photographs of Pierre Trudeau and his children along their road. It turned out that the pictures were in a purse that had been stolen in Halifax, and they were able to return the pictures to the owner.

A new style of sign was introduced in 2006. A one-piece design replaced the old sign that had the tab at the bottom. This new sign was easier to maintain. T-shirts are now available to our volunteers as a promotional item.

Also, in 2006, the Minister Transportation of and Public Works, Angus MacIssac joined AAH volunteers near Miller Lake to kick off the spring cleanup season. In 2011 our



hard working volunteers removed over 73 tonnes of litter from our roadways. Sunrise 4-H Club won our Cleanup Litter Sweep Contest by finding an intricately carved hockey puck along their section of highway.

In 2012 we followed the suggestions of our volunteers, and took our volunteer Information Session on the road. It was held in Port Williams, and included a tour of Valley Waste – Resource Management in Kentville Industrial Park. We now have 167 groups participating in our program.

HONORABLE MENTION!

The weather this fall was very unpredictable to say the least. Early fall was very wet, and some groups were rained out on their scheduled cleanup day, or had to abandon their cleanup early. Other groups, who did their cleanups near the end of the year, reported very pleasant temperatures.

A few groups carried out their cleanups under less than ideal circumstances. 596 Phoenix Air Cadets in Tatamagouche planned their cleanup on Nov. 5th to coincide with Cadet Day. The weather was unforgiving with a mixture of rain and wet snow and very gusty winds. However the cadets persevered, held on to their garbage bags, and managed to collect approximately 50 bags of garbage and 2 bags of recyclables. Well Done!

As well, we were all aware of the tragic fire that affected White Point Beach Lodge in November. We were amazed that after this heartbreaking event, they were still planning their roadside cleanup! They ventured out in early December, were fortunate to have beautiful weather, and enjoyed the fresh air. They collected 37 bags of litter and we applaud their resilience and dedication.

Thanks to <u>all</u> the groups who carried out their Fall Cleanups, especially those who had to endure difficult circumstances.

PLEASE SEND IN YOUR PERMIT!

To guarantee your cleanup is listed in the latest edition of our newsletter, please ensure a copy of your permit is forwarded to the Adopt-A-Highway office. This permit gives us important information such as the number of hours spent on the cleanups, amount of garbage collected, etc. If your group is missing from this cleanup list, please notify AAH, and you will be included in the next newsletter.

PUBLICITY IDEAS

One item that we are always interested in is added publicity and exposure for our program. Several groups are concerned that their volunteer base is dwindling, and they are looking for recruitment ideas.



There are some ideas that have worked for other groups. Advertise your cleanup in your local area. We have printed AAH Clean-up notices that you can request from our office. You could post them in your local area, with the planned Clean-up date, and your contact information could be listed on the notice.

Many local papers have a Community Notice Column or Community Happenings Listing, and radio stations also have a Community Notice board where your group could post your upcoming cleanup.

Contact the local paper to see if they would be interested in covering your cleanup. If the word gets out, people may volunteer to help at your next cleanup. Letters to the Editor are another way to let the public know about your cleanup. A letter after the cleanup including the total of bags picked up and summary of the cleanup may catch the attention of prospective helpers. It may inspire them to help out next time.

Seabreeze Campers, near New Germany, noted that they put a sign on their pile of collected garbage after the cleanup. It said "This is your garbage picked up by us. Please try to keep the highway clean" Hopefully this will help to bring attention to their roadside cleanup and reduce the litter in this area.

WE'RE "IN THE NEWS"

We have recently received some publicity from two of our AAH groups. A write-up of "Fables" Club's cleanup on Hwy #6 near Tatamagouche was recently included in the monthly newspaper "The Light'.

SPRING CLEANUP PREPARATIONS

Now that winter is coming to an end, many groups are thinking about the upcoming spring cleanup.

Here is a check list of items to help you prepare.

Discuss with your group the best day to perform the cleanup.



- Request an Adopt-A-Highway Program Litter Cleanup Permit at least one week before your cleanup from the Department of Transportation, so that they can arrange to have safety vests, garbage bags, etc. available for you.
- ✓ On the day of the cleanup, review the safety guidelines with all members of your volunteer group.
- Make sure the contact person for your group has a copy of the permit with them during the cleanup.
- ✓ Take along a camera and enter the Spring Clean Sweep Contest by taking a picture of an unusual find from your cleanup. Cash prizes available are \$200, \$100, and \$50.
- \blacksquare Fill out the permit after your cleanup.
- Return department vests and unused garbage bags, etc. Keep a copy of the permit for your records, give the Department of Transportation a copy and send a copy to the Adopt-A-Highway office. This is very important! This information is essential for our records, and is needed for your group to be included in our newsletter.

UNUSUAL FINDS:

We're always amazed at what turns up in the ditches, and this year many unusual items were uncovered. They included: *blue hair, a duvet, surgical mask, love letters (interesting*



to read!), a pair of bloomers, carpet, a screen door, a quilt, new fireworks, a shopping cart (which was useful), bag of corn cobs, new Christmas tree stand, a Lions Club sign, set of dishes (intact), boots, skates, electric floor polisher, bag of dog Milk-Bones, Buzz Lightyear shield, shoes, paring knife, animal carcasses, breadboxes, camp chair, and a ring.
