SUCCESSFUL V.I.S HELD IN MAHONE BAY

Our Volunteer Information Session was held on March 29th at the Mahone Bay Centre. It was a day filled with interesting speakers, exchange of ideas and lively conversation.

The participants were welcomed by Ellen Simpson, Co–Chair of the AAH committee. We were happy to have Don Downe, mayor of the Municipality of Lunenburg County, and John Bain, Councillor with the town of Mahone Bay join us to deliver welcoming remarks to our volunteers. They both passed along thanks to the volunteers for their efforts, and were happy that we had come to their area for our conference.

Kirk Symonds, Waste Educator with Region 6 Solid Waste Management, provided an enlightening presenta-



tion exploring the history of garbage. He passed along many tips that people could use to reduce the amount of waste that goes to the landfill.

Kirk also led an informative tour around the Mahone Bay Cen-

tre. He pointed out that there is always the option to sort recyclables and compost along with the garbage container. A variety of stations were observed throughout the centre (pictured above) and some of the units were quite reasonably priced.

Chantal Moore, with the Clean Foundation (formerly Clean N.S.) provided an overview of two major litter initiatives. The Great Nova Scotia Pick-Me-Up is a major community cleanup program. They have been helping groups carry out cleanups around the province for 25 years. Their cleanups had similarities with AAH cleanups, as the majority of the litter collected came from the fast food industry. The Ship to Shore program was started because of the alarming amount of garbage that was evident along the shoreline and in the water

around the province. This program provided proper sorting stations and garbage receptacles at various wharves. They have received positive feedback from the fishermen and



boaters. The industry benefits from the program as the condition of the harbours and underwater environment is improving. Ellen Simpson (on the right, in the photo below) is shown thanking Chantal for her educational presentation.

There was much discussion and exchange of ideas during the Volunteer Round Table. Participants introduced themselves, and their associated AAH group.

A tasty soup, sandwich and dessert lunch was served by the New Germany & Area Lions Club. Nancy Veinot of this Lions Club (who also participate in the AAH program) had helped with the planning of our VIS and offered to provide the refreshments for our session. The delicious food was thoroughly enjoyed by our volunteers.

We were all impressed by James Hebert of Lower Branch. Even though he was only 12 years old at the time, he managed to get an illegal dumpsite cleaned up that was bordering a local fishing spot. The Departments of Transportation and Infrasturcutre Renewal and Environment, various community groups and the municipality



all lent equipment and manpower to clean the area up. Over 50 volunteers worked most of a Saturday to get rid of the unsightly mess. Good work James to have the persistence to get everyone on board!



Different groups presented summaries of their roadside cleanups. Kevin Conrick with the Annapolis Valley Geocachers (pictured at left) outlined how his group became interested in our program and had great slides of their unusual finds. Nancy Veinot of the Alexander Family, passed along hints that have made their cleanups easier through the years. They use a bucket while picking up the garbage, and dump it

into a the garbage bag when it is full. Sharon Hubley, of Hill n' Dale 4-H club outlined their many years in the program, and how they involve all ages in their cleanup. The younger members help prepare the lunch while the older members carry out the road side cleanup.

Joanna Dunn, Manager of N.S. and P.E.I. Business Operations with the National Diabetes Trust Corp. (pictured on the following page) gave an interesting presentation on Diabetes. She also pointed out the importance of the Clothesline program as their fundraiser. It is very easy to donate clothes which they resell, and in addition the clothing is not going to the landfill. They

hire local groups or individuals to maintain their drop boxes. Clothes can be donated even if they are ripped or stained, as they can be made into rags. They are members of the Textile Recyclers Coalition who are working together to reuse or recycle even more clothing. Last year they collected 7,000 tonnes of material and diverted this from the landfill.

We were glad that the volunteers that attended the session

found it informative and worthwhile. The Mahone Bay Centre was a splendid venue, with very helpful staff. The speakers were excellent, and we were glad that they could take time to join us at the weekend conference. Special thanks to the companies and individuals that donated door prizes for our session. We have refillable pocket hand sanitizers, tape measures, bandage dispensers, pens, and window decals available.

Spring Cleanup Preparations

Now that winter has come to an end, it's time to start thinking about your upcoming spring cleanup.

Here is a check list of items to help you prepare.



- Discuss with your group the best day to perform the cleanup.
- Request an Adopt-A-Highway Program Cleanup permit at least one week before your cleanup from the local depot of the Department of Transportation and Infrastructure Renewal (TIR). They will arrange to have safety vests, garbage bags, flagging tape and supplies ready for your group.
- On the day of the cleanup, review the safety guidelines with all members of your volunteer group.
- Make sure the contact person for your group has a copy of the permit with them during the cleanup.
- Take a picture of your unusual finds, and enter our Spring Litter Sweep Contest
- Fill out the permit after your cleanup.
- Return the department vests and unused garbage bags, etc. Keep a copy of the permit for your records, give the Department of TIR depot a copy and send a copy to the Adopt-A-Highway office. This is very important! This information is essential for our records, and is needed for your group to be included in our newsletter.

WE WANT YOUR INPUT Send Along Your Pictures...

We love to have pictures of your group doing your Spring & Fall Cleanups. Snap some photos of your group and send them to the Adopt-A-Highway office when you submit your cleanup permit. They may be included in the upcoming



editions of **LITTERature**! You could also include "before and after" shots of your highway or interchange area.

...And Your Ideas



At our Volunteer Information Session, our participants emphasized that they like to hear about other cleanups. Do you or your group have a particularly good idea for keeping your group involved, or an ingenious way of collecting litter along your adopted section of roadway? Send in your suggestions and ideas and we'll pass them along in a future newsletter. One idea passed along at our V.I.S. involved scrap metal. If a large amount of metal objects are found during your roadside cleanup, they can be taken to the metal recyclers for cash!



They had 10 volunteers last fall and collected 10 bags of garbage. Their unusual finds include a skunk carcass, diapers, mud flaps, and a Dolly Parton CD. They are appreciative of the help they receive from the TIR depot in Berwick. In the Spring of 2013, they also used their AAH cleanup to participate in the Clean Across N.S. campaign.

FALL 2013 IN REVIEW

We had pleasant weather last fall, and we were happy that fifty-four groups across the province were able to carry out their Fall cleanup. A grand total of 1,096 bags of garbage and recyclables were eliminated from our highways. Our volunteers covered 248 kilometers of roadsides and five exits of Nova Scotia highways. The material removed is equal to 16.4 tonnes. We were fortunate to have 812 volunteers generously give their time (1660 hours to be exact!) to achieve this remarkable event. We are appreciative that so many groups were able to get out and improve the appearance of their communities.

TOTAL FOR 2013

The **total for the year** is over <u>72 tonnes</u> of garbage and recyclables (4,866 bags) picked up off 784 kilometers of road ways and nine exits, by over 2,000 volunteers. Well done & Thank You!
