(The following information was taken from the Homestead website)

Adelaide Hunter Hoodless Homestead is the birthplace and childhood home of one of Canada's most eminent citizens.

This mid-nineteenth century Neo Gothic style homestead was built in1830 by John Bray. David and Jane Hunter, Adelaide's parents, purchased the property in 1851 and it was owned by the Hunter family until 1906.

The property was owned by various families in the first half of the 20th century until the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada purchased the Homestead in 1959. The F.W.I.C., along with the help of women's institute groups, world wide, renovated the farm house to reflect the time period in which the Hunter family would have lived there. The furnishings within the home were donated largely by WI members.

Adelaide was designated by the Historic Sites and Monument Board of Canada as one of Canada's most eminent women in 1960.

In 1995 the Historic Sites and Monument Board designated the Homestead a National Historic Site.

The Homestead is located in Brant County, Ontario on the outskirts of the village of St. George.
