

RESPIRATORY WATCH

Week 8 (February 17, 2019 to February 23, 2019)*

IN SUMMARY...

Activity levels**

- Central, Eastern, and Northern Zones have localized activity. Western Zone is reporting sporadic activity.
- There are 6 influenza outbreaks being reported this week, and several schools have reported increased absenteeism rates.

Laboratory-confirmed cases***

- There were 44 influenza A and 1 influenza B case reported this week. There have been 304 laboratory confirmed cases of Influenza A and 5 laboratory confirmed cases of Influenza B reported during the 2018-2019 influenza season.
- Positive test results were received for RSV.

Severity

• There have been 34 ICU admissions in adults and 3 ICU admission in children (age group 0-19 years). There have been 12 deaths*** of laboratory confirmed influenza during the 2018-2019 influenza season. All deaths have been in adults.


Syndromic surveillance

- The average ILI rate for Nova Scotia during this reporting period was 1.4.
- **92.5**% of emergency rooms reported ILI data during this reporting period. Cape Breton Regional, Glace Bay Health Care, and St Anne's did not report this week.

Notes: *Reporting weeks run from Sunday to Saturday. The 2018-2019 influenza season is defined using PHAC's influenza surveillance weeks. This year runs from August 26, 2018 (Week 35) to August 28, 2019 (Week 34);





ILI CASE DEFINITION

Acute onset of respiratory illness with fever and cough and with one or more of the following – sore throat, arthralgia, myalgia or prostration which is likely due to influenza. In children under 5, gastrointestinal symptoms may also be present. In patients under 5 or 65 and older, fever may not be prominent.
