1.0 Purpose

1.1 To provide a comprehensive system of translating clinical evidence to clinical practice in order to enhance patient outcomes and safety.

### 2.0 Guiding Philosophy

2.1 Emergency Health Services (EHS) systems should adopt out-of-hospital devices, medications, protocols and procedures only after unbiased research has demonstrated their out-of-hospital benefit, safety and cost effectiveness.

#### 3.0 Definitions

3.1 Clinical Practice Guidelines: guidelines for patient treatment and care based on scientific evidence and adapted to patient needs; formerly known as protocols.

# 4.0 Policy

- 4.1 EHS clinical practice guidelines must adhere to the guidelines outlined in Appendix A of this policy.
- 4.2 Out-of-hospital clinical practice guidelines must continuously align with evidence-based consensus on science and treatment recommendations and must be adapted to patient needs by incorporating evidence from:
  - 4.2.1 Community needs
  - 4.2.2 Published evidence
  - 4.2.3 Operational evidence

EHS clinical practice guidelines must consist of the following mandatory elements:

- Scope and Purpose: the aims of the guidelines are clearly described with objective, clear clinical questions defined and applications to patients described.
- Stakeholder Involvement: focusing on the extent to which guidelines represent the views of its intended users.
- Appropriate Rigour of Development: as it relates to the process needed to gather and synthesize evidence as well as the methods needed for formulating the recommendations.
- Appropriate Clarity and Presentation: focusing on specificity and distinct treatment options being considered, with appropriate application support tools.
- Consideration of Applicability: as it relates to organizational, behavioural and cost implications of applying the guidelines.
- Maintenance of Editorial Independence: of the recommendation and acknowledgement of possible conflict of interest from the guidelines development group.
