Toll-Free Number for Farmers to Get Hay, Forage

Nova Scotia farmers are now able to get hay and other forage for their livestock from farmers who have extra through a toll-free telephone number.

“Many farmers have been affected by poor weather this year and do not have enough feed for their livestock for the coming winter,” said Brooke Taylor, Minister of Agriculture. “AgraPoint will maintain a list of farmers with available hay and forage, and put them in touch with other farmers who need it through this toll-free number.”

The number, 1-866-606-4636, is operated by AgraPoint International Inc. from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday to Friday. Farmers can leave messages after hours and AgraPoint staff will respond the next business day. Farmers with extra forage can also provide their information by e-mail by sending it to r.hutchinson@agrapoint. Any changes in the listing will be posted on www.extensioncentral.com by 10 a.m. each morning, Monday to Friday.

Contact information, location and details about the hay and forage available are also posted online at www.extensioncentral.com.

“We understand that many livestock farmers are facing a difficult situation and we want to help them make it through these difficulties,”

said Mr. Taylor. “AgraPoint specialists can also discuss feeding and cropping options with producers as they manage these challenges.”

Program to Help Cape Breton Farmers

Cape Breton farmers affected by excessive amounts of rain this summer can apply for higher interim payments through the AgriStability program, Agriculture Minister Brooke Taylor announced on Sept. 25.

AgriStability, one of the new business risk-management programs for farmers, provides support after large income losses. The program is part of the five-year Growing Forward agreement signed by federal, provincial and territorial agriculture ministers in July.

“We recommended an increase in interim payments to 75 per cent, up from 50 per cent, under AgriStability, to help these farmers who have experienced extraordinary wet weather conditions this year,” said Mr. Taylor. “I am pleased with how quickly federal and provincial officials met with the Cape Breton farmers to discuss the situation and to provide this assistance.”

After evaluating the affected farms earlier this month, provincial and federal agriculture officials agree

that federal-provincial programs will assist with the cash flow needed to cover the loss of crops caused by the weather conditions.

AgriStability is available to all Canadian farmers, but those in Cape Breton are able to access a larger interim payment.

“I want to encourage the Cape Breton farmers who are enrolled in AgriStability to submit their applications for interim payments as soon as possible,” said Mr. Taylor. “These payments will then be processed in a timely manner.”

Producers enrolled in AgriInsurance, also known as Production Insurance, could have a significant portion of their crop losses covered through this program. They should contact the Nova Scotia Crop and Livestock and Insurance Commission staff if they have questions or to initiate a claim. AgriInsurance is also part of Growing Forward.

Growing Forward programs are cost shared 60 per cent federally and 40 per cent provincially.

Important Rural Agriculture Business Receives Government Investment

A rural poultry processing plant that has been supporting the growth of Nova Scotia's agricultural industry for the past 65 years, will receive an investment from the province of Nova Scotia for working capital.

A \$3.5-million loan for ACA Co-operative Ltd. in New Minas, through the Department of Economic Development's Industrial Expansion Fund, will help the company maintain 650 jobs with an annual payroll that exceeds \$25 million annually. ACA also creates almost as many spin-off jobs.

"This sole poultry processor for Nova Scotia has grown significantly over the years and continues to seek and develop new markets for its quality products," said Economic Development Minister Angus MacIsaac. "This investment further demonstrates the province's commitment to supporting economic growth in rural areas of the province and maintaining important jobs."

Since 1943, ACA Co-operative Ltd. has grown to include seven divisions including eggs, feed, hatchery, poultry, retail farm equipment and processing. The company operates a processing poultry meat operation, breeder barns for producing selected genetic broiler chicken crosses, chick hatchery, feed mill, table egg division


and grading facility, a retail division for farm furnace and diesel fuel, farm equipment division, and an outlet store.

"ACA is an integral part of Nova Scotia's agricultural industry, which generates about \$450 million in the province," said acting Agriculture Minister, Ron Chisholm. "Along with chicken, it processes nearly all of the turkeys available in Nova Scotia and 25 per cent of our eggs, offering people the opportunity to buy local food products."

The company's major customers include Sobeys, Co-op Atlantic, Sysco Food Service and commodity markets in Ontario and Quebec. Its annual sales exceed \$110 million.

"We take great pride in producing top-quality products for our customers and playing an important role in our industry," said Sue Payne, chief executive officer of ACA Co-operative Ltd. "With this investment, we will continue to contribute to the industry and support our community."

The Industrial Expansion Fund is one method used by the government of Nova Scotia to support economic development in the province. The Industrial Expansion Fund has considerable flexibility in the amount and type of funding it can provide.

AgriInvest and AgriStability Deadline Reminder for 2007

The September 30, 2008 deadline to submit 2007 AgriInvest and/or AgriStability application(s) has passed. If you missed this deadline, you can still submit the form until December 31, 2008, but a penalty for late filing will be applied. For AgriInvest the allowable net sales used to calculate your matchable deposit will be reduced by five per cent for each month (or each part of the month) your form is submitted late. For AgriStability your payment will be reduced \$500 for each month (or each part of the month) your form is submitted late.

The 2008 AgriStability Enrolment Fee Deadline

Most producers would have already received their enrolment notice for 2008 AgriStability. The deadline to pay the fee amount was April 30, 2008 or 30 days after the enrolment notice was dated. If you have missed the deadline you may still pay the fee but a late penalty charge of 20 per cent will be added to your fee. Participants have until December 31, 2008 to pay the fee with penalty. If you have not received an enrolment notice for 2008 AgriStability and believe you should have, contact the federal administration by calling 1-866-367-8506.

AgriStability 2009 Enrolment

Producers who did not participate in 2008 AgriStability must request a New Participant package before December 31, 2008. To request an AgriStability new participants package or for more information, visit the AgriStability web site at www.agr.gc.ca/AgriStability or call AgriStability toll free at 1-866-367-8506.

AgriStability 2008 Interim Applications Are Available

The Interim Application is available for producers who would like to apply for the 2008 program year assistance earlier than normally available. As a program participant, you cannot receive your full 2008 AgriStability payment until your 2008 program year is complete. By using the Interim Application, you can estimate your 2008 income and

expenses and receive a portion of this payment early. The deadline to apply for the interim is March 31, 2009.

AgriInvest 2007

Details regarding the AgriInvest program for 2007 will be communicated to producers late this fall. If you selected to deposit your AgriInvest Kickstart payment into the federal account you have the option to withdraw this money at anytime by calling the AgriInvest Administration at 1-866-367-4276.

Programs Update

The Farm Investment Fund (FIF) is still accepting applications, with nearly 600 received to date. There is still time to apply for projects that you wish to undertake this fall. You are encouraged to claim projects as they are completed, which will help you finance multiple approved projects. There is no limit to the amount of claims you may submit.

The Agri-Food Industry Development Fund (AFIDF)

Applications are still being accepted for categories A through E with 78 applications to date. These include applications to the Specified Risk Material (SRM) Handling category and the Strategic Infrastructure Investment Fund (SIIF) category.

Orchard and Vineyard Transition Program (OVTP)

There has been good uptake of the OVTP program, with 98 applications received to date for the 2007-08 and 2008-09 program years. Applicants plan to remove 875 acres. Claiming can occur when plant material (stems, branches, and roots) are removed from site and destroyed. There is no limit to the number of claims you may submit.

To initiate the claiming process, send in your claim form that accompanied your Letter of Agreement. When the claim form is received, it will trigger a post inspection. Payment will follow shortly after verifying the

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completion of the project. The OVTP Program is scheduled to continue until 2011, as budget permits.

Open Farm Day is an Atlantic wide event which has grown since its beginning in 2001. In Nova Scotia, the number of farms participating was up from 40 in 2007 to 50 farms province wide in 2008 – the most of any of the Atlantic provinces.

The weather cooperated with a clear and crisp fall day. Nova Scotians came out in record numbers to visit the farms. One family reported that they visited seven different farms and enjoyed a different experience at each one.

Stepping Up – Planning for the Challenges of Invasive Alien Species in Nova Scotia Workshop

December 3 and 4, Wolfville, NS

The impacts of invasive plants in Canada are extensive and well known. They pose direct agricultural, environmental and social costs from lost production values, higher management costs, reduced environmental and amenity values. It is estimated that invasive alien species cost the Canadian agricultural community \$2.2 billion each year. They have intense environmental impacts and are directly responsible for the decline of 44 species at risk in Canada. They can also seriously affect human health.

Invasive Weed Councils are stepping up across the country to address this issue. Councils exist in the provinces of British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario and are coming soon to Nova Scotia. The Nova Scotia Invasive Species Working Group is hosting a two-day workshop on December 3 and 4 at the K.C. Irving Environmental Centre, Acadia University. Called “Stepping Up-Planning for the Challenges of Invasive Alien Species in Nova Scotia”, it is designed to inform, engage, and coordinate stakeholders in addressing the issues of invasive alien species in the province.

Learning About Land Trusts for Kings County

Land Trusts Seminar November 17, at the Old Orchard Inn, Greenwich, NS

The Kings County Federation of Agriculture, in partnership with the Municipality of County of Kings, the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture, Service Nova Scotia and Municipal Relations and the Nova Scotia Federation of Agriculture, is hosting a one-day session on the option of using land trusts to preserve agricultural lands.

Preserving Agricultural Lands: Tools for Success (Learning About Land Trusts for Kings County) is intended to begin a discussion on the variety of land trusts available, and have an in-depth overview of the specifics required to establish a

successful land trust that will provide some financial incentive for farmers to keep land in agriculture as part of a broader strategy on sustainable land use planning. Speakers include Wayne Caldwell of the University of Guelph; Richard Hubbards from the Franklin Land Trust in Massachusetts; and Melissa Watkins from the Ontario Farmland Trust. The four Atlantic Federations of



Government Invites Applications for Adjudicative Agencies, Boards and Commissions

In Nova Scotia, there are over 30 provincial adjudicative Agencies, Boards and Commissions (ABCs). These ABCs serve various roles and diverse interests. Adjudicative boards have quasi-judicial functions; these boards take evidence, make findings of fact and law, and make decisions affecting a person's liberty, security, or legal rights. Board members need to apply legal principles as well as sound professional and technical principles for the decisions under their consideration.

Applicants should describe in their application/resume how they have demonstrated the following in their work, volunteer, or other life experiences.

- Respect for the essential dignity of all persons regardless of their circumstances and commitment to diversity and employment equity
- Ability to apply a broad perspective on issues, and work with a team to listen to others, constructively solve problems,

make objective and fair decisions, and reach consensus in a timely manner

- Ability to deal professionally with confidential and sensitive information
- Ability to communicate effectively and write clear and concise board reports
- Peer/community recognition of high ethical standards and integrity in professional and personal interactions

Preference will be given to applicants with previous involvement/experience in matters related to the respective board's function. In addition to the above noted criteria, any head or chair of an adjudicative board should have a proven ability, preferably as a board or meeting chairperson, in leading groups to constructively solve problems and bring about fair and consensus-based decisions.

Nova Scotia 4-H Council Sponsors 4-H Members at International Events

With financial assistance from the Nova Scotia 4-H Council, two 4-H members will attend international 4-H events this fall.

Jamieson Ward from Annapolis County was one of three Atlantic delegates who attended the 54th National 4-H Dairy Conference in Madison, Wisconsin, from September 28 - October 1. Each aspect of this program was designed to expand the 4-H member's understanding and appreciation of the dairy industry. Delegates participated in educational sessions at the University of Wisconsin Agricultural Campus, toured many interesting facilities such as Hoard's Registered Guernsey Farm, Hoard's Dairyman Magazine Publishing Co., National Dairy Shrine Museum and Nasco International. In all, 180 4-H members attended from across the US and Canada.

4-H delegates to the conference learned about production aspects, feeding, management, genetics, new concepts in dairy production, marketing and how to conduct hands-on dairy activities in their club. The highlight of the conference was attending the World Dairy Expo.

This November, Jesse Dowe from Cumberland County will represent Nova Scotia at the International 4-H Judging Seminar at the Canadian Western Agribition in Regina. Jesse won Reserve Champion in the Grand Champion Judging Competition at the Nova Scotia 4-H Show in September.

Jesse will be part of the three member 4-H Maritime team. The group will have training sessions on how the competition works, judging practice, competition and some free time to see the Agribition. Over the course of a couple of days the 4-H competitors in the judging

competition place a class of articles (such as cereals or grain) or livestock (from alpacas to beef) and give reasons on their placing. Judging serves to teach young people decision making, public speaking, and reasoning skills, as well as building their confidence.

Nova Scotia 4-H Members to Attend the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair

Eighteen 4-H members will travel to Toronto to compete in two prestigious cattle shows at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair in Toronto this November. Participants were selected at the Nova Scotia 4-H Show in September on the basis of the quality of their calf.

Attention: Recycling Used Pesticide Containers Here's What to Do:

1. Allow the formulation to drain from the container into the sprayer tank for at least 30 seconds.
2. Add water (at least 20% of the contents of the container), replace lid, and rotate so that the interior of the container is rinsed.
3. Empty the rinse water into the spray tank and drain for 30 seconds.
4. Repeat the above procedure twice more.
5. Render containers unuseable by puncturing.
6. Leave label on the container.

Containers that have been handled in this way are technically suitable for disposal.

The United Farmers Co-Op on Keltic Drive, in Sydney River, is now accepting properly cleaned pesticide containers for recycling. You can drop off containers at the Co-op Country Store for recycling, please see staff prior to dropping off containers. No five gallon buckets or plastic bags accepted.

Gardening Advice

- Fall provides the success for next year's garden.
- All the debris should be removed i.e., old plants, tops, etc.
- The soil should be reviewed for growing requirements.
- The garden plan or rotation will indicate which plots need compost or manure.
- If you have excessive weeds or grass you many want to turn over the soil and mix in the manure or nutrients.
- Avoid using a rotor tiller or heavy equipment unless you are fall plowing.
- Excessive soil work when it is wet will cause compaction.
- Prevent grass and weeds from getting well rooted and starting in the spring.

Fall Planting

- Garlic has become increasingly popular and is great for fall planting.
- Other crops such as strawberries may require some protective coverage. If straw is unavailable, try some spruce bows. Bows can also be used to hold down straw.

As gardening seems to be a growing trend, I am hoping to collect some information for another workshop for late fall.
