### Flexible, Innovative Programs for Agriculture Industry

Nova Scotia farmers will get more support to achieve profitability and incorporate innovation with new programs announced by the federal and Nova Scotia agriculture ministers on, April 6.

The program details come after the signing of the Growing Forward agreement between the governments of Canada and Nova Scotia.

“The Growing Forward programs focus on supporting innovation, commercialization and profitability for our farmers,” said Mark Parent, Minister of Agriculture. “The Department of Agriculture, in partnership with our agriculture and agri-food industry, will continue to support flexible program development that will meet the unique needs and opportunities of Nova Scotia.”

“Farmers expect all levels of government to work together to drive Canadian agriculture and this agreement is making that happen,” said federal Agriculture Minister Gerry Ritz. “Growing Forward delivers stable and bankable programs that work for farmers. The agreement we signed will kick-start the rollout of these essential programs in Nova Scotia.”

Growing Forward is a national agriculture framework to co-ordinate federal and provincial agriculture policy. Federal, provincial, and territorial governments are delivering \$1.3 billion for farm families over five years. The agreement with Nova Scotia will deliver almost \$25 million for agriculture in the province. The funding is cost-shared 60-40 between the federal and provincial governments.

Growing Forward programs are tailored, with input from farmers, to meet Nova Scotia's diverse regional requirements.

Producers who did not participate in 2008 AgriStability must request a New Participant package before April 30, 2009. ### 2007 AgriInvest Notices and AgriInvest Kickstart Top Up

Producers who elected to participate in AgriInvest 2007 will be receiving AgriInvest notices soon. The notice will include the 2007 AgriInvest account balance and steps to withdraw AgriInvest funds.

For the 2007 program year, producers do not have to make a deposit to receive 2007 AgriInvest benefits. This is a transition measure while the

federal government works toward having accounts held in financial institutions. AgriInvest accounts are currently held by the federal government.

Producers that participated in the AgriInvest Kickstart program will be receiving an AgriInvest Kickstart final benefit. The AgriInvest Kickstart benefit has been increased from 2.63 per cent to 3.25 per cent of Allowable Net Sales (ANS). The top up amount will be placed into AgriInvest accounts held by the federal government. Producers have the option to withdraw the money or leave it in their AgriInvest account.

### AgriInvest and AgriStability Deadline Reminder for 2008

September 30, 2009 is the deadline to submit AgriInvest and/or AgriStability application (s) for the 2008 program year. Forms and guides are available from the Canada

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# Nova Scotia Crop & Livestock Insurance Commission

## Production Insurance

### Application Deadlines 2009:

Potato – April 19  
Corn, Soybean – April 30  
Weather Plan – April 30  
Spring Grain – March 14  
Vegetable – March 14

All producers who hold an active contract of insurance in one or more of the above plans will receive a Coverage Quote form(s) before the beginning of the crop year. This will give them an opportunity to choose their price option and coverage level for the upcoming growing season.

**Reminder:** If you are planning to apply for an advance through the Advance Payments Program (APP), please keep the above application deadlines in mind. In many cases, the APP requires participation in Production Insurance as a security for the advance.

**Dairy Producers** – If you are considering insuring your animals against disease or loss of income from milk sales as a result of specific perils, it is not too late to apply for Dairy Insurance. To find out more give the Commission office a call.

**Poultry** – This plan was introduced in October 2007. It offers protection against ILT in broiler, layer and breeder flocks. All producers are encouraged to apply as soon as possible to ensure that they are protected against this risk.

**Weather Plan for Forage** – This plan focuses on crop losses related to weather events. It guarantees 80 per cent of the average long term rainfall (mm) at a designated local weather station over a period of time (May 1 - August 31). An optional Quality Rider is also available for excessive rainfall in the month of June during prime harvest time. Managed pastures and stored forage acreage can be insured.

**Wildlife Compensation** – The Nova Scotia Crop and Livestock Insurance Commission offers a Wildlife Compensation Program to Nova Scotia farmers who experience losses to animals or crops as a result of uncontrollable wildlife. This program applies to specific livestock as a result of predation by specified wildlife. Similarly specified crops are covered for losses as a result of wildlife damage. There are a

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## Local Direct Marketing Vendors Receive Funding

Nova Scotians will have easier access to fresh food and sellers will be better able to connect with consumers thanks to funding for five food direct-marketing initiatives.

Agriculture Minister Mark Parent announced on March 18, \$1.267 million in funding to help strengthen local food direct marketers' infrastructure and sustainability.

"This investment complements the province's food marketing programs, Select Nova Scotia and Taste of Nova Scotia, by promoting the variety and quality of food Nova Scotia has to offer," said Mr. Parent. "We encourage farmers and other food producers to continue in innovative new business ventures to bring their foods more directly to consumers."

The funding aims to increase consumer access to local products and help agriculture businesses sell more directly to consumers.

Funding will allow:

- Taproot Farms in Port Williams, Kings Co., to launch a community-shared agriculture venture, build a commercial kitchen and roadside stand.
- Halifax Farmers' Market to further its goal of building a bigger, new facility to accommodate the market's growing popularity.
- O'Connell's Family Farm, in Upper Stewiacke, to upgrade its meat-cutting facility, and develop a stable location for the Stewiacke Valley Farmers' Market.
- Cape Breton Farmers' Market, in Sydney River, to renovate to better serve vendors and the public.
- Celtic Country Market, in Bras d'Or, to expand for value-added processing and marketing local products.

"These projects will help accelerate economic potential and development," said Mr. Parent. "They were chosen for their strong business plans and benefits for the agri-food industry in the province."

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# Agricultural Literacy Day

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Last spring marked the start of a new educational initiative of the Nova Scotia Agricultural Awareness Committee. Modeled on a highly successful program in the United States, Ag Literacy Day is simply a day when school children are encouraged to celebrate agriculture in our province. On the first day of spring (a great day to think about agriculture), volunteers from agricultural sectors across the province went into schools to read and donate books about farming to school children. The discussions that follow offer opportunities to bridge

the gap that exists in the public mind between food and local agriculture.

This divide is hardly surprising, since only about 7500 people work directly in agriculture in Nova Scotia. This represents only about 1.2 per cent of our population. This is one tenth of the representation in Saskatchewan where 12 per cent work on farms, and half the Canadian national average of 2.4 per cent. In Nova Scotia, most families are two to three generations away from the farm.

Does that matter? We think it does. Informed citizens can make healthier choices about food. Fast food has become such a way of life that one survey in Britain revealed that for people aged 8–14 years, 36 per cent were unable to identify the main ingredient in french fries. We need ways to improve our vision of real food.

As consumers, our personal connection with agriculture can affect our food product selection. Knowledge of local farm communities can help create a population which supports a viable agricultural sector in the province.

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## Despite Rising Retail Prices, Farmers Not Receiving More

Today, Nova Scotians are spending more on groceries than ever before. The increase in price at the retail level has not yet reached farmers in the province. Many commodity prices have shown little increase, while others have actually decreased.

Nova Scotia producers are spending more to produce food and receiving less for their products. At the same time, consumers are experiencing increased prices in their food basket. The gap between retail and farm gate prices continues to widen. Presently, hog farmers are only receiving between 12 per cent and 14 per cent of the grocery store price of pork cuts, apple farmers are not doing any better. As food becomes further processed, farmers are getting less and less share of the food dollar. The farmer who grows potatoes for french fries receives a minuscule eight per cent, while the beef farmer only gets seven per cent of the price of a t-bone.

Richard Melvin, President of Nova Scotia Federation of Agriculture says, “Though increasing, Nova Scotians continue to enjoy a reasonably priced food basket in comparison to other regions; farmers are not receiving the same increases in price.” Melvin adds, “the widening gap between retail and farm gate is a serious issue in Nova Scotia, which needs to be addressed. To ensure the future of the industry we must increase the farmer’s share.”

## Two 4-H Members Win International Travel Awards From the Canadian 4-H Council

Along with nine Canadian delegates, Brianna Shaw from Annapolis County attended the USA National 4-H Conference in Maryland on March 28 – April 2. They spent two days in Ottawa at a program orientation, a Citizenship ceremony at the Ottawa Court House and touring Ottawa. The Canadian delegates traveled to Chevy Chase, Maryland to join approximately 300 U.S. 4-H delegates at the US conference.

Throughout the conference, delegates participated in issue oriented workshops and educational sessions pertaining to the theme Pathways to Progress; Transforming Tomorrow. They had the opportunity to visit points of interest in Washington, including Arlington Cemetery, the Smithsonian Institute, Lincoln Memorial and Capitol Hill.

This conference brings together youth, volunteer leaders, state and county extension staff members from across the United States, the U.S. Territories and Canada. Its purpose is to increase their awareness and understanding of specific topics through participation in issue-oriented workshops. In addition, it enhances leadership skills through conference assignments and builds and enhances public awareness of 4-H.

Amanda Lowe, an 18 year old 4-H member from Inverness County, has been awarded the 2009 W. Garfield Weston Foundation 4-H United Kingdom exchange trip from the Canadian 4-H Council and will travel to the UK from June 12 – July 18.

Three Canadian 4-H delegates will spend approximately five weeks in the U.K. as guests of several families. Canadian delegates will attend the Royal Show in Warwickshire and visit the Experimental Farms in Sittingbourne. Each Canadian delegate will host a U.K. delegate for a month when they arrive in Nova Scotia on October 3.

The W. Garfield Weston Foundation 4-H United Kingdom Exchange provides the opportunity for

delegates to participate in an educational international travel opportunity and to build on existing leadership skills. Delegates learn about the 4-H/Young Farmers' program, agriculture, food and natural resources in the United Kingdom while being an ambassador for the Canadian 4-H program and rural Canadian youth. Through this program, Canadian 4-H families have the opportunity to broaden their outlook on the world by hosting a young adult from another country and experiencing their culture.

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## 4-H Members to Meet at Atlantic EBI Showcase

Seventy 4-H members from Atlantic Canada will participate in the annual Eastern Breeders 4-H Showcase June 23 – 25, 2009 at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College.

For 19 years, Nova Scotia's 4-H program has partnered with Eastern Breeders Incorporated (EBI) to provide intensive livestock training in the most current livestock techniques for 4-H beef and dairy members from Atlantic Canada. Members who are 14 years of age and have a minimum of two years experience with the 4-H dairy and beef projects can attend this event.

Along with financial assistance, EBI provides the Atlantic event with highly qualified staff to ensure 4-H members learn proper animal management and preparation skills for showing cattle that will prepare them to be better contenders in the show ring and leaders in the agricultural industry. 4-H staff with

the Department of Agriculture partner with EBI to provide organizational skills on behalf of the Atlantic 4-H Committee.

During the two-day workshop, specialists from Eastern Breeders Incorporated will teach the latest techniques in showmanship, clipping and herd management — all skills that can be used on the family farm.

After two days of training, 4-H members compete for top honours with their calves at the beef and dairy show. Awards will be presented to the winners in each class. The show will be held on Thursday, June 25 at the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition Grounds in Bible Hill. The public is welcome to attend.



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## **4-H Members to Showcase Communication Skills at Annual 4-H Weekend**

Former 4-H members are often recognized by their strong communication skills and the 4-H program is proud to be able to teach youth exceptional speaking skills at an early age. In the process of this life skill training, 4-H members gain self confidence, develop leadership skills and poise.

On May 8 – 9, 2009, 4-H members from across Nova Scotia will compete in provincial public speaking and demonstration competitions at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College in Bible Hill.

The event hosts 250 4-H members and families from across the

province. In addition, 4-H members compete in the woodsman competition and the Nova Scotia Horse Classic. On Saturday, May 9, the NSAC Alumni Theatre will be the venue for 4-H Night in Nova Scotia, a finale that showcases talented 4-H members, presents the top overall communication winners and county entertainment as part of the evenings program. 4-H members and leaders who have won National 4-H Travel Awards, as well as the winners of the provincial competitions will be recognized. The public is welcome to attend the weekend events and view the 4-H members in various competitions.

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## **4-H Rural Employment and Life Skills Program**

4-H staff have developed the REAL Skills 4-H project for 4-H members from the ages of 14 – 21. The Rural Employment and Life Skills Program (REAL Skills) project allows 4-H youth to learn practical farm, leadership and communications skills through a 4-H project which helps prepare them for employment. 4-H staff, working in partnership with organizations and government departments, have included such courses as food safety, WHMIS, Students in Business, tractor safety, and CPR/ First Aid. Sessions included several dynamic presenters that encouraged youth to think big, set goals, achieve, contribute to their community, invest

in agriculture, learn business skills, and network with others. The program also included a 100 Mile Meal and a panel of young farmers discussing their passion for their agricultural businesses. Besides the 4-H members, rural and agricultural organizations were invited to attend the Sunday program.

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## **Camp Rankin Offers Camping and Career Experience To 4-H Members**

Camp Rankin, the provincial 4-H camp, will welcome 4-H members, aged 9 – 15, at five camps this summer from July 5 to August 7. There will be four, one- week camps and one, three-day mini camp.

Camp Rankin offers 4-H members opportunities to learn crafts, drama, nature, outdoors, recreation, healthy living, exploring 4-H, canoeing, water safety and to socialize with youth with similar interests. While at this camp, participants are provided with a memorable experience that keeps them coming back each year as campers and as camp staff.

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4-H members are reminded of the May 1 deadline to register for this year's camping season.

Besides providing a positive experience for campers, Camp Rankin provides employment for seven camp counsellors for youth aged 16 or older, a camp director and an assistant director. Trained camp counsellors lead 4-H members through all traditional camp activities and educational sessions where 4-H members carry out their motto "learn to do by doing."

In 1972, Camp Rankin was built by volunteers as a Centennial project of the Richmond County 4-H Leader's Council and is situated on 60 acres of land at Cape George, near St. Peters. The recreational and camp activities for 4-H members at Camp Rankin are administered by the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture, in conjunction with the Richmond County 4-H Leader's Council.

## **Think Safety**

Spring is a busy time on many farms. With the many tasks that have to be done, the opportunity for accidents increases. In addition to the many spring jobs that have to be done, be sure to make time to ensure your farm is safe for you and your family.

Now is a good time to:

- Check fencing around ponds and manure storages.

- Ensure PTO guards are in place.
- Take extra precautions to guard against manure gas in liquid manure storages.
- Check your farm first aid kit(s) to ensure they are fully stocked and ready for use.
- Make sure your fire extinguishers are full and in place on machinery and in buildings.
- Make sure your slow moving vehicle signs are on equipment and can be seen.

Kevin Grant was a great friend of 4-H and it is in his honor that members are able to take part in this outstanding opportunity.


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## 4-H Weekend

## Do You Have the Proper Drivers Licence?

If you are hauling any trailer (with a truck or tractor) that has a weight over 4500 kg you need a Condition 15 Endorsement on your licence to legally drive on Nova Scotia roads. These regulations apply to both class 5 and class 3 licences. If you are interested in obtaining your Condition 15 Endorsement there is a opportunity for you coming up at the NSAC.

When: May 7 and May 14, 2009

Where: NSAC Farm

Total Cost: \$55.87

How: There is a four step process to obtain your Condition 15 Endorsement.

First, call Michael Kittilsen to register at (902) 893-3645 and book your test time.

Second, purchase a "Road Test Receipt" which costs \$45.48. This receipt can also be purchased at an Access Nova Scotia Center or on-line. <http://www.gov.ns.ca/snsmr/rmv/licence/>

Third, upon completion of a successful test you will be given a form by the Driver Enhancement Officer. The form must be then taken back to an Access Nova Scotia Center to be processed (to have the Cond 15 put on your licence). There is a fee of \$10.39.

You must have a valid drivers licence to be eligible for testing.

There is an information session on April 30, 2009 to become familiar with equipment being used on test day. If interested in the session, let Michael know so you can register for that event as well. The equipment being used is a one tonne GMC Sierra (2000) truck and a Featherlite flatdeck trailer with a registered weight of 20,000 kg.

## From Continuing Education at NSAC

### Pesticide Applicator's Certification

This course teaches you the basic principles and practices of safe use, handling and storage of pesticides. It is excellent preparation for those writing the Pesticide Applicator's Examination. Course content ranges from integrated pest management principles to doing your own calibration and calculations. Participants will write the Pesticide Applicator's Examination on the last day of the course. To obtain your pesticide applicator's license, you must first pass the examination. If you take this course, we administer the exam at no additional fee and forward it to the Department of Environment. The Department of Environment will mail you your exam result, and you may purchase a license through that office. Who should attend? Any individual using commercial class or restricted class pesticides that requires certification in order to apply these products.

4-H members and leaders across the region will soon be gearing up for their 4-H Achievement Day.


