### Funding Grant Supports School Gardens

Students will be better able to make the connection between food and local agriculture with school gardens funded by the province.

"School gardens provide a valuable teaching opportunity by helping students link the food on their plate with a local farmer," said John MacDonell, Minister of Agriculture. "This program will help students understand and appreciate the valuable contribution of the agriculture industry in creating good jobs and growing the economy throughout Nova Scotia.

"There is tremendous value in having a hands-on project for students to make the connection on how Nova Scotia's food grows," said Education Minister Ramona Jennex. "I look forward to seeing the excitement generated when students experience this seed-to-harvest project.

A one-time grant of \$500 per school is available from the Department of Agriculture's School Garden Project to build and maintain a garden. The grant can also be used for teaching materials and soil testing fees.

"The announcement of funding for school gardens is a great step in the right direction," said Michael Howell, leader of Slow Food Nova Scotia, which promotes the appreciation of food. "If a child grows food from scratch and learns how to cook it, he or she is very likely to appreciate it and eat it. School gardens contribute to healthy schools, communities, local economies and healthy citizens."

The total available through the school garden project is \$20,000 to be distributed proportionally across school board regions.

## **Business Innovations Will Grow Agriculture Industry**

The Department of Agriculture helps Nova Scotia farmers and producers come up with fresh ways of doing business. One of the best ways to do this is to help them add value to what they already produce.

I am sure people have heard the term value added. It means different things to different people, but in this case it boils down to having our farm and fish business owners developing products that compete on value, instead of just price.

There are many ways to increase the value of the agricultural and agri-food products we produce in Nova Scotia, from processing to packaging, labeling and creating unique, innovative goods. Our agriculture and seafood industries are extremely well-positioned to take advantage of these kinds of business opportunities.

Many local and regional producers are already adding value to what they produce. Blueberries are being turned into premium blueberry juice for export, a wide range of home and beauty products are being made from lavender grown in Nova Scotia and specialty artisan cheeses are being made by hand.

Value-added products can generate a greater return on investment and are an excellent opportunity for research and collaboration. They lead to economic growth and a greater diversity of products offered to consumers.

Like any business venture, there is risk involved. A successful value-added product requires input from marketing, production, regulation

and food science and safety experts.

Staff in the department's product and quality development division offer guidance with the strategy needed to take advantage of new opportunities. These growth areas also require solid management, a well-developed business plan and financial commitment.

Our experts know about consumer and market trends, product innovation and where to find the expertise that farm and fish businesses need to make good decisions. 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## Bio-pesticides Priority Setting Workshop A Success

The second annual Bio-Pesticides Priority Setting Workshop was held March 21, 2011 in Ottawa. The meeting included growers from across Canada, crop specialists, representatives from the Pest Management Centre, Agriculture Agri-Food Canada Research Centres, Pest Management Regulatory Agency, Provincial Agriculture, University researchers and bio-pesticide manufacturers.

In addition to those attending in person, a number of participants were linked by video conference from several AAFC research centres across Canada, including the Kentville Agriculture Centre.

The purpose of the workshop was to select eight bio-pesticide priority projects in four crop categories to be either registered for use in Canada or to have the registered label expanded to include other crop uses. The crop categories were: field crops and pulses, field-grown fruit and vegetables, greenhouse food crops, greenhouse and outdoor-grown ornamental crops.

Prior to the selection process a number of informative presentations were given by bio-pesticide manufactures describing various products that they hope to register for use in Canada.

The AAFC Pest Management Centre will be working with bio-pesticide registrants to complete the following projects. For field crops and pulses, control of diamond back moth in Canola and control of downy mildew in hops.

- For field grown fruits and vegetables, control of sedges and rushes in cranberries, as well as, control of tarnished plant bug on strawberries.
- For greenhouse food crops, control of thrips in cucumbers and control of powdery mildew in tomatoes.
- For greenhouse and outdoor grown ornamental crops, control of thrips in greenhouse ornamentals and control of chinch bug on turf.

Several of these products will be useful to growers in Nova Scotia and many of the products selected are approved for use in organic production.

## Minor Use Priority Setting Workshop Provides New Pest Management Solutions For Nova Scotia Growers

The Minor Use Priority Setting Workshop was held March 22-24, 2011 in Ottawa. This workshop was sponsored by the Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada's Pest Management Centre (PMC). The purpose of the workshop was to select a number of projects to provide solutions to pest management problems through the User Requested Minor Use Label Expansion program of the Pest Management Regulatory Agency (PMRA). The workshop has been held annually since 2003.

The workshop was well attended with over 250 delegates representing grower associations, federal agricultural researchers, PMC and PMRA staff, provincial researchers, extension specialists, minor use coordinators, USA I-R 4 representatives and pesticide industry representatives.

The projects were selected from the National Minor Use Priority List. This list was compiled from grower-generated lists from each province. The list is divided into three sections: entomology, plant pathology, weeds and plant growth regulators. One day of the workshop is devoted to each of these disciplines. Each list is composed of 300-500 projects. Ten projects from each discipline are chosen to be worked on by the Pest Management Centre in the

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following year (2012). There are also five regional projects which are chosen by the minor use coordinator(s) from each of the regions, British Columbia, Prairie Region, Ontario, Quebec, and Atlantic Region. There are also two projects chosen for organic production. In addition, if projects are selected as a high priority, but there are no known solutions, these can be selected for screening trials. Up to two projects without solution are chosen for each discipline.

As a result of this years workshop, a number of projects were selected that will benefit growers in Nova Scotia. Entomology projects include control of tarnished plant bugs on strawberries and greenhouse peppers, whiteflies on greenhouse cucumbers, cutworms on spinach, pear psylla on pear and fir coneworms in conifer seed orchards. Pathology projects include control of downy mildew on greenhouse cucumber, white mold on field grown head lettuce and leaf lettuce, pythium on carrots, fruit rot on cranberries and root rots on raspberry. Herbicide projects include control of broad leaved weeds on garden beet, parsnip, green onions, highbush blueberry, strawberry, control of nutsedge on radish and liverwort on outdoor ornamentals.

The projects for organic production are control of cucumber beetle on cucumbers and a screening trial for bacterial spot on field grown tomatoes.

The Atlantic region's project choice is control of grasses on wild blueberry.

Screening trials will be done for seed corn maggot on Chinese cabbage, powdery mildew on greenhouse and outdoor ornamentals, broad leaved weeds on Chinese cabbage and for spreading dogbane on wild blueberry.

The 2011 Minor Use Priority Setting Workshop was a great success and once more demonstrates the spirit of cooperation and good will that can be achieved on a national basis.

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## Programs and Business Risk Management

### **AgriInvest and AgriStability**

AgriInvest and AgriStability are business risk management programs that help producers protect their income and manage risks like drought, flooding, low prices and increased input costs.

AgriInvest provides farmers with flexible coverage for small income declines as well as support for investments to mitigate risks or improve market income. Farmers deposit money into an AgriInvest account and receive matching government contributions. If you receive an AgriInvest deposit notice you have 90 days to respond by making your deposit.

### **2009 AgriInvest Deposit Notices**

AgriInvest deposit notices have been mailed out with information on how to make your 2009 deposit. Once you receive your deposit notice, you can open an account at your financial institution and make the deposit by the deadline indicated in order to receive a matching contribution from governments. Existing funds currently held by the federal government will then be transferred to your AgriInvest account. Producers can request a withdrawal from their AgriInvest account through their financial institution at any time throughout the year.

AgriStability is a margin-based program that provides support when a farmer experiences larger farm income losses. AgriStability covers declines of more than 15 per cent in a farmer's average

income from previous years. If you participated in AgriStability in 2009 you will automatically be enrolled for 2010 and will be receiving your enrolment notice soon. If you have not received your 2010 enrollment notice and have not heard from AgriStability you should contact the number below.

### **New Participants or Farmers - AgriStability 2010 Enrolment**

Producers who did not participate in AgriStability in 2010 and wish to participate in 2011 must request a new participant package before April 30, 2011. To request your package or for more information, visit <http://www.agr.gc.ca/AgriStability> or call toll-free 1-866-367-8506.

### **AgriStability 2010 Interim Applications Are Available**

The interim application is available for producers who would like to apply for an advance for the 2010 program year. As a program participant, you cannot receive your full 2010 AgriStability payment until your 2010 program year is complete. By using the interim application, you can estimate your 2010 income and expenses and receive a portion of this payment early. The deadline to apply for the interim is March 31, 2011.

### **AgriStability/AgriInvest 2009 harmonized form final deadline**

If you missed the September 30, 2010 deadline, the final deadline

was December 31, 2010 with a \$500/month reduction to your payment.

### **AgriStability 2010 final fee deadline**

You will be ineligible to participate in AgriStability for the 2010 program year if the final December 31, 2010 deadline was missed.

## Cogmagun Poultry Processing Company Ltd.

Cogmagun Poultry Processing Company had its grand opening April 11, 2011. The event was attended by Agriculture Minister John MacDonell along with a number of other government and industry representatives.

An invitation is extended to interested poultry producers and non-producers to visit the new plant at 760 Cogmagun Road, Centre Burlington, Hants county. Beth and Cameron Taylor, mother and son partners in Mill Acre Farm have consistently worked to produce quality purebred Dorper breeding stock, lamb, free range pork and beef on their farm.

The Taylors began processing their own family's supply of chicken and turkey a number of years ago, when finding a plant to process their birds became difficult. After contacting William Feltmate at the Department of Agriculture for advice, Beth and Cameron opened a small poultry processing facility and operated it for four years. Business grew due to the quality of service and word of mouth, and they began processing birds from as far away as Bridgwater, Halifax, Shubenacadie, Noel, Wolfville, and points in between.

It soon became apparent that there was a need for another provincially inspected poultry processing plant in the central mainland area for both families and licensed poultry producers who require a

provincially inspected plant for their processing needs. The Taylors decided to invest in the idea, and construction began on Cogmagun Poultry Processing Company Inc in May of 2010.

The plant will operate from May through December and will deal strictly with poultry and water fowl. Although the processing plant will offer custom slaughter, it will specialize in providing value added options for customers. Custom options include cutting, packaging, freezing, weighing, labeling, and developing new poultry products with and for customers.

The new plant is expected to be operating as a provincially inspected facility by May 2011. The Taylors look forward to working with licensed poultry producers, exploring new ideas, adding value to their products and further promoting the "buy local" campaign for Nova Scotia's farming community.

## Advance Payment Program (APP)

The Advance Payment Program is returning for 2011-12. This program improves marketing opportunities for agricultural products by extending an advance to producers so they can improve cash-flow. Any one person or farm business is limited to an interest-free advance of up to \$100,000. Producers repay the advance by December 31, 2011 or participate in the fall portion of the program.

To participate in the fall portion of the program, crops must be in storage. The advanced funds must then be paid by September 30, 2012. Typical crops eligible for coverage are barley, corn, oats, rye, hay, soybeans spring and winter wheat.

Producers must have crop insurance to be eligible for the spring portion of the program. Producers must agree to a credit check by Soil & Crop Improvement

Association of Nova Scotia (which will be done by a third party.) Producers must provide an assignment on the crop insurance policy for the crop. An administration fee of 1.5 per cent of the total advance is charged to producers to cover program administration costs.

The program is administered by Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada through the Soil and Crop Improvement Association of Nova Scotia.

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## Nova Scotia 4-H Members To Attend Canadian and American Conferences

Eleven 4-H members will join their counterparts from across Canada and the United States to learn about leadership and discuss issues affecting young people at two prestigious conferences in April.

Ten members will get to see the political processes in action when they attend the 39th annual National 4-H Seminar in Ottawa, April 8-14. They will join 55 other 4-H members from across the country to learn about rights, roles and responsibilities as Canadian citizens.

Participants will attend a swearing-in ceremony for new Canadians at Citizenship Court and tour Parliament Hill, the Supreme Court of Canada, National War Museum, Museum of Civilization and a camp at Fulton's Pancake House and Sugar Bush.

"We are pleased to have many 4-H members attending these conferences," said Ruth Grant, senior 4-H program co-ordinator. "They will be excellent ambassadors for Nova Scotia and our 4-H program."

Megan Smith of Nine Mile River, Hants Co., will represent the province at the United States national 4-H conference in Maryland, April 2-7. The conference will help young people develop and practice the knowledge, resources and skills learned through 4-H. Participants will discuss topics affecting youth

and empower and mobilize 4-H members to create positive social change in their communities.

## Eastern Breeders Showcase Held in June for 21st Year

For 21 years, the Eastern Breeders Showcase has taught Atlantic 4-H members the finer points of livestock showmanship and herd management. This year, the event will be held June 26 to 28 at the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition Grounds in Bible Hill.

Experts from Eastern Breeders Inc. and 4-H leadership coordinators with the Department of Agriculture will teach about 70 4-H members the latest techniques in show preparation for beef and dairy cattle, health of the show calf, livestock judging as well as the latest techniques in showmanship, clipping, display design and herd management.

"We take pride in the fact that this is not only a top notch 4-H competitive show but also an effective learning exercise. Each year we get a chance to give back some experience and knowledge of our industry. Even more importantly, we get to reinforce values. 4-H develops enthusiasm, determination, work ethic, resourcefulness, responsibility and ultimately pride," said Paul Stewart, supervisor of genetic programs and communications at Eastern Breeders Inc.

Department of Agriculture rural leadership staff provide organizational skills on behalf of the Atlantic 4-H committee to help make the showcase possible.

After two intense days of training, members will show calves at the beef and dairy show on Tuesday, June 28 at 9:30 a.m. at the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition Grounds. Awards will be presented for showmanship, confirmation and excellent in session work over the two days of instruction. The public is invited to attend.

The Atlantic Dairy Heifer Show that was to be held in conjunction with this event has been cancelled.

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## Camp Rankin Offers Camping and Career Experience To 4-H Members

Camp Rankin, the provincial 4-H camp, will welcome 200 members to five one-week summer camps from July 3 to August 5. Campers aged nine to 15 will learn skills training, leadership, and healthy living while building lasting friendships in a scenic setting on the Bras d'Or Lakes in Cape Breton.

Camp Rankin offers members opportunities to learn canoeing, crafts, drama, nature and outdoors, exploring 4-H, recreation and healthy living and to socialize with youth that have similar interests. Many members that have had a great camping experience come back each year as campers and later on as camp staff. Members are reminded of the May 1 deadline to register for this year's camping season.

Besides providing a positive experience for campers, Camp Rankin employs seven camp counsellors for youth aged 16 or older, a camp director and an assistant director. Trained camp counsellors lead 4 members through all traditional camp activities and educational sessions where members carry out their motto "learn to do by doing."

In 1972, Camp Rankin was built by volunteers as a Centennial project of the Richmond County 4-H Leader's Council and is situated on 60 acres of land at Cape George, near St. Peters. The recreational and camp activities for 4-H members at Camp Rankin are administered by the Department of Agriculture in conjunction with the Richmond County 4-H Leader's Council.

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## 4-H Members to Showcase Communication Skills at Annual 4-H Weekend

Many 4-H members say that they credit the 4-H program for developing their communication skills, including listening and speaking skills to build self confidence and poise. On May 6 and 7, members from across Nova Scotia will compete in provincial public speaking and demonstration competitions at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College in Bible Hill.

The event hosts 250 members and families from across the province. In addition to communication contests, members compete in the woodsman competition and the Nova Scotia Horse Classic.

On Saturday May 7, the Nova Scotia Agricultural College Alumni Theatre will be the venue for 4-H Night in Nova Scotia, a finale that showcases talented members. It presents the top overall communication winners and county entertainment as part of the evenings program. Members and leaders who have won Canadian 4-H Council National 4-H Travel Awards and the winners of the provincial competitions will be recognized.

## **Disposal of Used Farm Sharps**

The Department of Agriculture's Agriculture Kentville office has a supply of sharps containers available at no cost for producers. Remember, sharps must not be discarded in regular household garbage. Sharps should be collected on farms in rigid, puncture resistant containers with tightly secured lids.

## **Think Safety**

Spring is a busy time on many farms. With the many tasks that have to be done, the opportunity for accidents increases. Be sure to make time to ensure your farm is safe for you and your family.

## **Now is a good time to:**

- Check fencing around ponds and manure storages.
- Ensure PTO guards are in place.
- Take extra precautions to guard against manure gas in liquid manure storages.

- Check your farm first aid kits to ensure they are fully stocked and ready for use.
- Make sure your fire extinguishers are full and in place on machinery and in buildings.
- Make sure your slow moving vehicle signs are on equipment and can be seen.

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## 4-H EAKS... Experience, Attitudes, Knowledge and Skills... and More!

February 23, 2011 was no ordinary day for a group of children from the North End Community Centre in Halifax. These children and parents, numbering forty, toured three farms in Lunenburg County as part of 4-H EAKS.

Youth visited Springauff Dairy Farm in First South, where Allan Croft introduced most to their first experience with a cow. He then demonstrated how milking took place and how the milk is handled on the farm. Then the group traveled to Terra Beata Cranberry Farm where David Ernst demonstrated how cranberries grow and the various products made at Terra Beata. The final stop was at Kevin and Susan Veinotte's farm in West Northfield where the children were able to experience everything from chickens, cattle, draft horses to sheep.

4-H EAKS is a program which was taken on by the Lunenburg County 4-H Council with sponsorship dollars from the RBC Outreach Program, which promotes a rural urban exchange with youth. Funding is managed by the Canadian 4-H Council.

The 4-H EAKS has three main goals: The first goal is to: teach participants how to grow a garden. Earlier in the year, 4-H Members and parents from the Two Bays 4-H Club shared their expertise with the youth as they instructed the planting of a garden in early June, with seeds and supplies purchased through the EAKS funding.

The second component was meeting a farmer and touring farms, which was the focus of the February 23 event.

The final component will be Food Project Lessons, which will be given by senior 4 - H Foods Members from Lunenburg County.

While the program is still ongoing, the youth have learned a little more about growing food, where food comes from and a better appreciation of the agricultural community within the area. 4-H Members have shared talents and skills they have developed through their experiences in the 4 -H Program!

The February 23 event was coordinated by the members of the Valley Regional Team as well as personnel from the North End Community Centre.

## Do You Have the Proper Drivers Licence?

Drivers operating a farm tractor trailer combination over 14,000 kg need a Condition 23 Endorsement.

If hauling any trailer (with a truck or tractor) that weighs over 4,500 kg, a Condition 15 Endorsement is needed to legally drive on Nova Scotia roads. These regulations apply to class 5 licences.

Contact the regional agriculture office to obtain these endorsements and a date and place will be arranged for the testing to take place. Once a testing date is set the following process must take place for each condition.

There is an information session on Thursday, April 28, to become familiar with the equipment being used on test day. If you're interested in getting these endorsements, there is an upcoming opportunity at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College on Friday, May 6 at the college farm.

### PROCESS: For Condition 15

1. Purchase a road test receipt which costs \$47.68 (HST Included) This can be purchased at an Access Nova Scotia Center or online at [www.gov.ns.ca/snsmr/rmv/licence/](http://www.gov.ns.ca/snsmr/rmv/licence/) .

### PROCESS: For Condition 23

1. Complete a Condition 23 application prior to testing
2. Have a driver's medical exam completed by your doctor
3. Purchase a road test receipt which costs \$46.85 (HST Included). This can be purchased at an Access Nova Scotia Center or online at [www.gov.ns.ca/snsmr/rmv/licence/](http://www.gov.ns.ca/snsmr/rmv/licence/) .

Please register with the Central Region office first and have a valid drivers license ("N" removed) to be eligible for testing. The Condition 23 application, the form for the medical exam and more information is available at your regional office or by calling Michael or Theresa 893-3645.
