Understanding Compact Fluorescent Lighting

Compact fluorescent lighting (CFL) and High Performance T8 lighting systems are both great energy conservation options for many farming operations. HPT8 systems can reduce lighting costs by up to 40% compared to older style T12's. Compact fluorescent lights use 75% less energy than traditional incandescent lights.

There are many incentive programs to help Nova Scotians change their lights to more efficient options. Efficiency Nova Scotia offers the following programs that include incentives for upgrading lighting:

- The Direct Install Program (also known as Part of the Solution) installs CFLs free of charge in businesses. The program also installs other upgrades such as light-emitting diode (LED) exit lights, thermostats, hot water tank wraps, occupancy sensors and power bars with timers.
- The Small Business Energy Solutions program is designed for retrofits and provides a free lighting assessment and up to 80% funding, and a 0% interest loan on the remaining 20%, for lighting upgrades.
- The Business Energy Rebate program offers rebates on new lighting purchases.

Recycling Options and Safe Handling

Mercury is an element found naturally in the environment. Fluorescent lights contain a very small amount of mercury sealed in the tube or bulb. It's essential to a fluorescent bulb's ability to emit light but it's also toxic. Exposure can potentially cause health problems.

The US Environmental Protection Agency claims that using a CFL bulb reduces the amount of mercury in the environment due to decreased electrical consumption compared to an incandescent bulb. In order to prevent mercury from

ending up in the environment or the landfill, recycling fluorescent tubes and bulbs is recommended. Several municipalities and waste authorities have bulb crusher units.

The Department of Environment provides these tips for waste fluorescent lighting:

- Contact your municipality to find out if there are any specific requirements for fluorescent light disposal.
- Waste fluorescent bulbs can be returned for safe disposal at RONA and Home Depot stores.
- If disposed with household garbage, CFL bulbs should be double-bagged (Ziploc) and placed in the top of your garbage bag on your collection day. This minimizes the potential for breakage that could harm either the waste hauler or the homeowner.

LED lighting is an alternative to fluorescent lighting. The above-mentioned funding programs may also include incentives for LED lighting. For example, the Business Energy Rebate program offers a \$20 rebate on EnergyStar® rated LED globe or A-style bulbs greater than 10 watts that have at least a three-year warranty.

Programs and Business Risk Management Update

AgrInvest and AgriStability

AgrInvest and AgriStability are business risk management programs designed to help producers protect their income and manage risks like drought, flooding, low prices and increased input costs.

AgrInvest provides farmers with flexible coverage for small income declines and support for investments to mitigate risks or improve market income. Farmers deposit money into an AgrInvest account and receive matching government contributions. If you receive an AgrInvest deposit notice you have 90 days to respond by making your deposit.

AgrInvest Deposit Notices 2010

AgrInvest deposit notices are being mailed out with information on how to make your deposit and receive matching government contribution. Once you receive your deposit notice, follow the instructions included to make your deposit. The deadline to make the deposit is indicated on the deposit notice.

Producers can request a withdrawal from their AgrInvest account through their financial institution at any time throughout the year. For more information, contact the AgrInvest administration at 1-866-367-8506 or visit the website at www.agr.gc.ca/AgrInvest.

AgriStability is a margin-based program that provides support when a farmer experiences larger farm income losses. AgriStability covers declines of more than 15% in a farmer's average income from previous years. If you participated

in AgriStability in 2010, you will automatically be enrolled for 2011 and will receive a 2011 enrolment notice soon. If you have not received your 2011 enrollment notice and have not heard from AgriStability, you should contact them at 1-866-367-8506.

AgriStability 2012 Enrolment Producers who did not participate in 2011 AgriStability and wish to participate in 2012 must request a new participant package before April 30. The Genetic Enhancement Program

The Genetic Enhancement Program seeks to increase the competitive position of livestock by investing in improved genetic material for Nova Scotia flocks and herds. Funding is available on a per animal basis for eligible animals purchased after April 2, 2011. Eligible commodities include beef, sheep, goat and livestock.

Why should I have AgriInsurance?

As a producer, you are constantly faced with factors that are beyond your control. Things like adverse weather, disease, wildlife, and insect infestations can have a serious impact on your production and your income.

AgriInsurance, sometimes referred to as production insurance or crop insurance, adds some predictability to your business. It protects you against the effects of yield reductions and crop losses caused by insured perils. There are currently more than 115,000 acres, 17,500 dairy animals and 46 million birds insured annually in Nova Scotia.

AgriInsurance helps you:

- Maintain your cash flow in poor crop years with claim payments that offset losses caused by crop damage or low yields.
- Manage your operation with a more predictable cash flow.
- Provide collateral required to secure loans.
- Stabilize your AgriStability program reference margin over time.
- Gain affordable peace-of-mind by paying tax-deductible premiums that are cost-shared with government.

Crop Insurance Application Deadlines

Spring grain: March 14
Vegetable: March 14
Potato: April 19
Corn, soybean, canola and sunflower: April 30
Maple: April 30
Weather plan: April 30

All producers who hold an active contract of insurance in one or more of the above plans will receive a coverage quote form(s) before the beginning of the crop year. This will give them an opportunity to choose their price and coverage level options for the upcoming growing season.

Advanced Payments Program Reminder

If you are planning to apply for an advance through the Advance Payments Program (APP), keep the above application deadlines in mind. In many cases, the APP requires participation in Crop Insurance (or CAIS) as a security for the advance. Late applications for Crop Insurance cannot be accepted after the above dates.

Dairy Producers

The Commission is able to write new coverage for dairy livestock each month. If you are interested in insuring your animals against disease, as well as loss of income from milk sales as a result of disease or fire and building collapse due to ice and snow, it is not too late to apply for Dairy Insurance (includes all reportable diseases, as well as shipping fever and IBR, but does not include BSE or Foot and Mouth Disease). To find out more give the Commission office a call.

Wildlife Compensation

The Nova Scotia Crop and Livestock Insurance Commission administers a Wildlife Compensation Program for farmers who experience losses to animals or crops as a result of uncontrollable wildlife. This program applies to specific livestock as a result of predation by specified wildlife. Similarly, specified crops are covered for losses as a result of wildlife damage.

Maple Producers

The Nova Scotia Crop and Livestock Insurance Commission offers crop insurance for maple syrup production. This plan is available to all commercial maple producers and helps them to manage the risk of reduced yields due to natural perils. Any producers not currently enrolled in the program can apply now for coverage for the 2012-13 crop year (the February-March 2013 harvest season). The deadline for applying is April 30. Since this is a busy time in the maple woods, we encourage you to apply now to avoid missing the deadline.

Forage Producers

The Commission offers two plans for forage producers to help manage the risk in this crop from natural perils. These plans are a Forage Establishment Plan and a Weather Derivative Plan for forage production.

Forage Establishment Plan

The forage establishment plan protects against establishment failure in the first year of growth for grasses, alfalfa and other legumes. This plan covers losses from such things as, winter injury, drought, insects, diseases, floods, excess moisture, frost and wind. The plan covers your new forage crop from the time of seeding up until May 31, of the following year. Seeding must be completed by July 1, for legumes and legume/grass mixes and by September 1, for grasses. The deadline date to apply for this insurance is October 15, but you can apply as soon as your crop is seeded. When you apply for this insurance at seeding time your coverage can begin immediately. If you apply at some point after your seeding date, an inspection is required before coverage will be offered.

Weather Plan for Forage

This plan targets crop losses related to weather events. It guarantees 80% of the average long term rainfall (mm) at a designated local weather station over a period of time (May 1 to August 31). An optional quality rider is also available for excessive rainfall in the month of June during prime harvest time. Managed pastures and stored forage acreage can be insured. The Weather Derivative Plan for

Forage provides a guarantee of 80% of the long term average rainfall (using a 30 year average). A producer can choose two, three or four months of drought coverage between May 1 and August 31. Any part or all of the managed forage and/or pasture on your farm can be insured for up to \$288 per acre.

An optional quality rider can also be purchased for the month of June. When three consecutive days of rainfall of at least five mm are recorded, a payment of 20% your guarantee is triggered. Producers can receive up to two payments under this quality rider during the month of June. For the weather plan, rainfall measurements are based on the recorded rainfall from sites around the province,

primarily at Environment Canada weather stations. Producers select the site nearest their farm. This plan differs from other insurance plans since there are no yield measurements required. Once a drought or excess rainfall event occurs, based on Environment Canada weather statistics, a payment is triggered.

Both the Weather Derivative Plan for Forage and the Forage Establishment Plan require an annual application. For more information including the cost sharing with government for these programs contact one of our offices.



Annual Kevin Grant Rural Youth Tour Teaches 4-H Members Leadership Skills

Peggy's Cove, the reconstruction of the Bluenose and several farms will be a few of the stops for 10 youths visiting Lunenburg County from March 12-14. The young people will be part of the fourth annual Kevin Grant Rural Youth Leadership Tour.

Mr. Grant was a long time 4-H participant, government public servant and avid supporter of the Nova Scotia 4-H program. His legacy lives on through a fund that provides a significant endowment to the Nova Scotia 4-H Foundation to assist with rural youth development. After careful consideration of his wishes, the foundation has developed the rural youth leadership development tour named in his honor.

Its purpose is to present the 4-H members, between the ages of 15-17, with an opportunity to see a new and different part of Nova Scotia so that they can confidently make decisions about where they choose to settle, when they enter the workforce.

4-H members are selected from across the province for the tour through an application and interview process. During the three days they hear speakers and participate in tours with a business, agriculture and industry format. 4-H members learn about a specific region in the province; the community, community leaders, the local area resource based businesses and rural employers.

During the 2012 tour 4-H members will visit a Christmas tree farm, Peggy's Cove, a maple syrup operation, the reconstruction of the Bluenose, a small mixed berry farm and several businesses and historic sites in Lunenburg County. During various social activities they will have many opportunities for networking with 4-H members from the specific region they are visiting.

4-H Member Wins CIBC 4-H Scholarship

Jessica Overmars believes being a leader is about inspiring people, taking the initiative to put ideas into action, setting goals and being a role model. That is exactly what she did when she sent in her essay to apply for the 2012 CIBC 4-H scholarship.

"The confidence and sense of responsibility I've gained in 4-H has led me in many different directions. Each year, I help organize a village clean-up for my club. Also, with the help of other 4-H members, I organize an annual movie night to raise funds for different local charities," she said.

"This past year we raised money for Feed Nova Scotia and the Canadian Association for Community Living. From my 4-H experience, I have realized that you do not need to go to a developing country to volunteer. There are people in our own communities who need our help. I feel empowered to know that I can make a difference by doing small acts of kindness for others."

Ms. Overmars says she has been privileged to be a 4-H member for nine years. It has made her a responsible, active member of her community and a well-rounded young adult.

"I've developed a good attitude towards learning, responsibility, leadership and being a team player," she said.

Young people who are 16 years of age and have been a 4-H members for at least two years can apply to win the Department of Agriculture, the Nova Scotia 4-H Council, CIBC, Agriventure and the TD Bank Scholarships.

Each scholarship has specific requirements. The two Nova Scotia scholarships require an essay to be submitted with their completed application form. The essays are judged for style, subject knowledge, originality, quality and interpretation of research, spelling and grammar. Scholarships range from \$1,000 to \$3,000.

Applications are available in the General Leader Kit or from the local Agriculture and 4-H Leadership Coordinator.

Application deadlines vary, but begin with April 1, 2012, for Department of Agriculture scholarship and the Nova Scotia 4-H Council Scholarship. The deadline for the TD 4-H Scholarship is October. Deadlines for the CIBC and Agriventure 4-H Scholarships are in December.

Homegrown Success Program Reminders:

A reminder to those with current year program funding that all claims must be postmarked or received by the Department of Agriculture by March 1, 2012. Late claims will not be processed.

Include copies of all invoices with proof of payment (i.e. cancelled cheques, credit card statements, debit slips or official invoices marked paid and signed by supplier) to support completed approved project activities.

In addition to the claim form and proof of payment documents, copies of municipal building permits (if applicable) must be provided for the following approved projects: manure, pesticide or fertilizer storage construction.

Making good Farm Decisions

Take advantage of these remaining winter days to plan your summer projects.

What are the priorities for your farm? Have you reviewed your environmental plan lately? What is your soil's health? Are you expanding in any areas? Have you read any program information to see the trends that are happening? Have you updated your insurance lately? Pesticide points? Do you have a succession plan started?

There may be many questions and winter provides an opportunity to think and plan in some of these areas. Good farmers make time for planning and as a result make good decisions.

What are some examples that you should be considering and what information do you need to apply for potential programs? The Genetic Enhancement program requires some record keeping. Do you have a system in place to record the necessary information to participate in the program?

Recent extension workshops have demonstrated the benefits of winter bale grazing, grass fed opportunities, selecting the right bull for your farm, will pre-vaccinated feeders continue to lead the market price. How can you reduce costs to cash in on these high prices? These are just a few of the issues farmers have discussed at meetings or one on one.

Dairy Producers

Exploring energy alternatives, there are some neat examples of using your plate heater to maintain wash water temperature during the wash cycle. Several farmers are upgrading their feed storages, conducting good farmstead planning to see where future buildings should be added to the farm and what the farm will look like in the next ten years.

Blueberry Producers

Field days often provide valuable information. Have you attended one lately? Crop yields vary. What are the high yielding farmers doing?

Small-scale farmers are actively creating networks and getting together to learn more and share knowledge. We have vegetable clubs established, workshops, and many opportunities to get engaged. So whatever venture you are exploring, let us know or contact AgraPoint so we can assist you.
