Environmental Stewardship Award Open for Applications

Wildlife Compensation for Blueberry Growers and Bee Keepers

The Nova Scotia Crop and Livestock Insurance Commission administers the Wildlife Compensation Program for the province. This program provides compensation to growers who lose their crop as a result of uncontrollable wildlife. This also applies to honey bees and bumble bees or leaf cutter bees. To be eligible you must:

- Be a registered farmer under the *Farm Registration Act*.
- Report the damage to the Commission within 72 hours.
- Experience damage to crops affecting at least two (2) acres or experience a loss of at least \$250.
- Follow industry production and protection standards (e.g. fencing or caging of bee hives).
- Have damage that is readily identifiable, recent and measurable.

Policy for Bumble Bee Quads

Last year, the Commission implemented the following policy for settling compensation claims for bumble bee quads. Provided all other requirements for compensation are met, damage to bumble bee quads will be covered according to the following.

1. Full compensation (80%) will be paid where no more than 50% of bloom in a field has expired at the time of the damage.
2. 50% compensation will be paid where between 50-80% of bloom in a field has expired at the time of damage.
3. No compensation will be paid where 80% or more of the bloom in a field has expired at the time of damage.

As an exception to 1, 2 or 3, compensation may be paid in the event the quads were intended for another use after the blueberry bloom if:

1. The producer can provide a contract for the sale of the quads; or
2. A statement by another party about the intended sale; or
3. The producer is able to show Commission staff the new destination field requiring pollination.

Quads intended for another field must be removed from the original fields immediately after bloom. Where quads that have been used on a second crop field experience wildlife damage, compensation will be limited to 50% or less and will be determined on a case by case basis by the Commission's field agent.

Forage Establishment Plan

The forage establishment plan protects against establishment failure in the first year of growth for grasses, alfalfa and other legumes. This plan covers losses from such things as winter injury, drought, insects, diseases, floods, excess moisture, frost and wind. The plan covers your new forage crop from the time of seeding up until May 31 of the following year. Seeding must be completed by July 1 for legumes and legume/grass mixes and by September 2 for grasses. The deadline date to apply for this insurance is October 15, but you can apply as soon as your crop is seeded. When you apply at seeding time, your coverage can begin immediately. If you apply at some point after your seeding date, an inspection is required before coverage will be offered. This plan offers two levels of coverage which are \$200/acre (producer premium = \$5.00/acre) and \$100/acre coverage (producer premium = \$2.50/acre).

Crop Insurance Reporting Reminders

Crop Insurance clients are reminded of the following reporting requirements:

- File a seeding report no later than 10 days after planting.
- **Report damage when it occurs and within five (5) days of any potential loss or damage. File this report regardless of whether you believe you may have a claim. If damage is not apparent until harvest you must provide a Notice of Damage either while harvesting or within five (5) days of harvest. You can mail, fax, or phone in these reports.**

- File accurate yield information within 30 days of harvest.
- If you believe you have an insurance claim, apply using a Proof of Loss within 30 days of the harvest or the end of the crop year (whichever is earlier).

New Probable Yield Methodology in 2014

The Commission is required to have its methodology for estimating the yield potential of its clients certified by an actuary at least every five (5) years. The latest certification was completed in March 2014 and will be implemented for all Spring seeded crops for the 2014 crop year and the remainder of crops in 2015.

The new methodology includes:

- Moving all crop averaging period (AIY) from 15 years to 10 years (except blueberries which remains at seven (7) years for both odd or even year fields).
- Tree fruit AIY's are currently already at a 10-year averaging period and will remain.
- The Commission will use a new method for creating proxy yields for producers in all plans (except blueberries and tree fruit) that do not have full historical yield records. This method will now be a 10-year acre weighted average provincial yield.

SCIANS Advance Payment Program

Once again, the Soil and Crop Improvement Association of Nova Scotia (SCIANS) has been asked by the federal government to administer the Advance Payment Program for 2014-15. The purpose of the program is to improve marketing opportunities for agricultural products by extending an advance to the producers as a means of improving cash-flow.

Any individual or farm business can receive an advance of up to \$100,000 interest free. Producers repay the advance by December 31, 2014 for the spring portion of the program. If crops are in storage, an individual or farm business may participate in the fall portion of the program with repayment of advances by September 30, 2015. Crops usually covered are barley, corn, oats, rye, hay, soybeans, and spring and winter wheat.

Producers must have crop insurance to be eligible for the spring portion of the program. Also, producers must allow SCIANS to conduct a credit check, done by a third party. Producers must provide SCIANS with an assignment on the crop insurance policy. An administration fee of 1.5 per cent of the total advance is charged to producers to cover the cost of administering the program. Select Nova Scotia Local Food Connections – Cape Breton



A networking meeting was held on March 19 in Mabou, Cape Breton to help connect primary producers in the region with restaurant owners and chefs. This was an opportunity for chefs to find out what local foods are available in their region, and to encourage them to use the local foods in their menus.

It was the second time a meeting like this has been held in Cape Breton, and both times attendees left with new contacts that have helped them develop their businesses. Offering local food in a menu is a great way for a restaurant to provide the freshest ingredients and add something special to the food experience, especially if paired with a local wine or craft beer!

Producers also had the opportunity to get input from chefs about the types of products the chefs were looking for, so they could begin to plan their season.

Nine producers and seven chefs or restaurant owners discussed the types of foods that are being produced, how to transport the products to the restaurants, and when they would be available. According to producers, over the past two years these meetings have provided them with the opportunity to make connections within the restaurant industry, having resulted in significant economic returns.

EastGen Showcase Held for 24th Year

EastGen Showcase will be held July 11 - 13 at the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition Grounds in Bible Hill. For 24 years Atlantic 4-H members have learned the finer points of dairy and beef showmanship, management and judging.

On behalf of the Atlantic 4-H Committee, Agriculture Leadership Coordinators with the Department of Agriculture help make the showcase possible. In partnership with EastGen staff, Agriculture Leadership Coordinators teach approximately 90 4-H members the latest techniques in show preparation for beef and dairy cattle, health of the show calf, livestock judging, showmanship, clipping, display design, and herd management.

Atlantic 4-H beef and dairy members who are 13 - 21 years of age are eligible to attend EastGen. Those selected to attend will be expected to bring the information back to their 4-H club.

After two full days of training, 4-H members show their own calves at the beef and dairy show on Sunday, July 13 at the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition Grounds in Bible Hill.

Awards will be presented to the winners in showmanship and confirmation, as well as those who excelled in session work over the two days of instruction. The show is open to the public.

Camp Rankin to Open for 42nd Year

Camp Rankin, the provincial 4-H camp, will welcome 200 4-H members, aged 9 - 15, to five one-week summer camps. From June 29 to August 1 campers will learn training, leadership, and healthy living skills while building lasting friendships in a scenic setting at Cape George, near St. Peter's in Cape Breton.

"4-H members who attend Camp Rankin often come back for a second year," said Ruth Grant, Senior Agriculture Leadership Coordinator. "For the 42nd year we are pleased once again to offer this unique leadership development program to 4-H members and their friends in partnership with the Nova Scotia 4-H Council and the Camp Rankin 4-H Association in Richmond County."

Camp Rankin offers 4-H members opportunities to socialize with youth with similar interests and learn canoeing, crafts, drama, nature and outdoors, exploring 4-H, and recreation and healthy living. Many 4-H members have had a great camping experiences and come back each year as campers or as camp staff.

In addition to providing a positive experience for campers, Camp Rankin provides employment for seven camp counsellors aged 16 or older, a Camp Director and an Assistant Director. Trained camp counsellors lead 4-H members through all traditional camp activities and educational sessions, ensuring 4-H members carry out the motto "Learn to do by Doing"

4-H Clubs Participating in Buzz-Worthy National Campaign: *Proud to Bee a 4-H'er*

4-H members across the country are participating in a campaign to encourage more pollinators in their garden by planting bee - friendly seeds.

Proud to Bee a 4-H'er is a national campaign that is both fun and meaningful, and has been developed in support of 4-H Canada's objective to nurture and encourage skilled, engaged, and responsible youth leaders. 4-H also fosters an environment for young people to have fun with others, enjoy outdoor activities and make healthy choices.

Through this initiative every 4-H member in Canada will receive seed packets containing a bee pollinator mix and be encouraged to plant and grow a pollinator-friendly garden at home or in their community. Not only will *Proud to Bee a 4-H'er* stimulate active outdoor activities, it will allow youth to learn about the essential role pollinators play in creating a healthy ecosystem and a sustainable food supply.

Proud to Bee a 4-H'er is a partnership between 4-H Canada and Syngenta's, Operation Pollinator. Syngenta is one of the world's leading companies dedicated to bringing plant potential to life. Canadian Agriculture Literacy Week



Just as spring is a busy season on most farms, the Agricultural Awareness office has been hopping lately. March started off with **Canadian Agriculture Literacy Week**. The farm community really stepped up this year with 85 readers visiting 120 classrooms in 65 schools across the province. This means about 3,000 students got to meet a farmer and make that personal connection with Nova Scotia agriculture. Through the **Herald in Education program**, our office partnered on a comic book style insert in the Chronicle Herald in early April. Together We Make a Difference

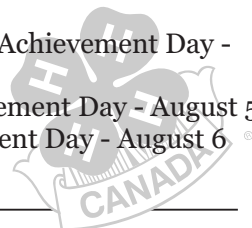

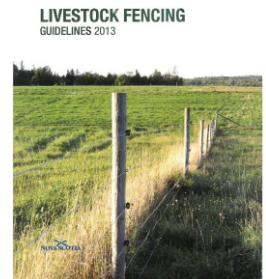

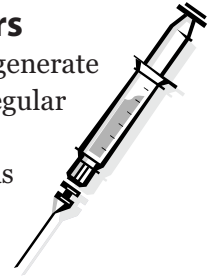
Courses begin again in September. Our new schedule will be posted to the website in late August.

Sharp Containers

Livestock producers generate medical waste on a regular basis. These wastes include sharps such as syringes, needles, broken glass tubes, lancets and scalpel blades. If not disposed of properly they can injure livestock and family members; increase risk of infection spread; pollute the environment; and put waste handlers at risk. Sharps must not be discarded in regular household garbage. Sharp containers have been specifically designed for disposing of sharps. When the container is full of sharps, the contents should still be considered potentially infectious to humans and animals but the risk is low. For disposal in any municipality, you must first check with your local disposal site to see what they have in place to accept sharps.



These containers can be picked up at the NS Department of Agriculture office in Cornwallis Park. Call 638-2395 for hours and information.

Land Asset Management

In May 2013, the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) completed a Land Asset Management (LAM) Pilot Project to investigate ways to improve decisions made about the use of Crown land. As part of the pilot project DNR issued a public tender for the development and operation of sugar maple harvesting facilities on four Crown land areas in Cumberland and Colchester Counties.

Since finishing the project review, DNR has decided to use the tools and processes that were developed during the pilot project to continue proactive planning of land asset management. DNR will soon issue a tender for agricultural production operations on approximately 187 hectares of Crown lands at Belleisle Marsh, Annapolis County.

DNR is working with the Department of Agriculture and Ducks Unlimited Canada to develop the Request for Proposal (RFP) to attract qualified operators who will enter into agreement with DNR to use Crown land at Belleisle Marsh for the purpose of developing and maintaining agricultural production operations within a wildlife management area.

The RFP is expected to be issued in the summer of 2014 and the tender notice will be available on the Nova Scotia Procurement Services Web Site (<http://novascotia.ca/tenders/tenders/ns-tenders.aspx>)
