
## NOVA SCOTIA AGRICULTURAL PROFILE | 2009




As of the 2006 Statistics Canada Census of Agriculture, Nova Scotia made up 1.7 percent of all farms in Canada. In 2006, the leading agriculture sector in terms of number of farms was fruit farming. The province produced \$509,520,691 in gross farm receipts (excluding forest products), accounting for 1.2 percent of all gross farm receipts in the country, making Nova Scotia the seventh largest province in terms of agricultural production.

Net cash income income (revenues less expenses) has been declining over the past few years, although the trend has been volatile over time. The gap between total net income and net cash income has been widening due to higher depreciation.





Figure 1. Net Cash Income and Total Net Income







Primary agricultural exports (crop and animals) have increased slightly over time but have been relatively constant in recent years. Food manufacturing exports (processed or value added food) have increased substantially, although this growth has recently been reversed somewhat by a rising Canadian dollar.




Figure 3. Agri Food Exports (less fishery products)- Nova Scotia




Figure 4. Farms by gross revenue class

Much of Nova Scotia's agricultural industry is made up of small and diversified farms (Fig 4). In percentage terms, there are fewer large and specialized farms in the province than the Canadian average.





Figure 5. Breakdown of farm revenues

Revenues at the farm level totaled \$474 million in 2008 (Fig 5). Livestock revenues increased 18 percent over 2007, while crop revenues increased 16 percent and program payments decreased 20 percent. Figure 6 shows the revenues of the top 15 agricultural sectors. Fur production was the sector which made the biggest gains over 2007, increasing by \$15 million (23 percent), while hog revenues were down \$9.9 million (53 percent)

With increased mechanization and consolidation, agricultural employment has declined over time. The average age of a farmer was 53.2 in 2006, higher than the Canadian average of 52.




Figure 7. Farm level employment
