Message from the Deputy Minister

On behalf of Nova Scotia's Department of Community Services, I am pleased to present our department's French-language Services Plan for 2010-2011.

This plan sets out our goals for the upcoming year and details our progress over the past year. Last year saw significant increases in translation requests and the number of French language training seats used by our staff.

The Acadian and francophone community have told us that early exposure to French language services will have the greatest impact on preserving its cultural identity. As a result, much of our progress over the last year was initiated in our Early Childhood division.

Our French language services plan continues to build on our earlier efforts while introducing new initiatives. The Acadian and francophone community will have even more access to consultation and information sessions in their own language. We will continue to focus our efforts toward early childhood and the youth of Nova Scotia in the hopes of making a lasting cultural impact.

The Acadian and francophone community play a vital role in the cultural diversity and richness of this province. Community Services is proud to work with the community as it establishes its *raison d'être*.

Responses to French Requests

The Department of Community Services has Communication and Translation Protocols in place and posted on our staff intranet site. These were also presented to our departmental Senior Management Team as well as all Regional Management Teams.

Our department is increasingly accepting grant applications in French and processing these with the assistance of translation services.

French-language Services Inventory

Our department now has a database of employees available to offer services in French. A directory will be available on our staff intranet site this year and maintained by our French language Coordinator. We now set translation and French training targets. These are tracked by program and posted appropriately on the DCS internet and intranet sites.

Community Services, along with other departments and community partners, play a vital role in the lives of Nova Scotia children and their families.
