The Event

Every year, youth in Nova Scotia are nominated for a variety of awards that recognize their contributions to improving our communities. These awards are issued by a number of Provincial Government departments and cover areas such as: **crime prevention**, **volunteering**, **intergenerational** projects, and work within **aboriginal communities**.

On June 3 2013, **12 youth** and 16 adults, including **two cabinet ministers** and **one MLA**, gathered to appreciate youth and recognize their efforts and contributions to their communities. Organized by the **NS Child & Youth Strategy**, the Departments of Labour and Advanced Education, Justice, Seniors & and the Office of Aboriginal Affairs in partnership with youth from the **Leader Of Today (LOT) Network**, the event gave young leaders from across the province a chance to learn from each other as well as inform government.

The luncheon provided youth and adults a unique opportunity to engage in meaningful dialogue with one another and to celebrate the good work being carried out by youth across Nova Scotia. The event culminated in the presentation of certificates to the youth by **Minister of Education**, Ramona Jennex and **Minister of the Voluntary Sector**, Marilyn More. Becky Kent MLA, emceed the ceremony which recognized all of the youth who were nominated.

We welcomed everyone to the event by conducting a ceremony that recognized the rich **diversity** in the room. Participants were given candles and asked to place them on a map of **Nova Scotia** as we acknowledged those of aboriginal, Acadian, African Nova Scotian, and European descent.

As a way to be inclusive of all participants, and to dispel **assumptions** we might make about each other, youth from the **Youth Project** facilitated an exercise on using **preferred pronouns**. We also ensured that there were **gender neutral washrooms** at the venue.
