REPORT OF THE FIRE MARSHAL

The Fire Prevention Act 1989 assigns the Office of the Fire Marshal authority and responsibility for the provision of fire safety in buildings and for safe storage of flammable and combustible materials. The Office advises various levels of government on fire-related matters, including fire protection. The Office is also responsible for the safe installation and use of propane and electricity.

The Office of the Fire Marshal, as a division of the Nova Scotia Department of Labour, emulates the department's vision and mission statements. To achieve our goals, staff participated in the Department of Labour's Commitment to Quality Program. To meet the previous year's task team recommendations, staff undertook the following activities:

- facilitated reviews by stakeholder groups on the Fire Prevention Act, Electrical Installation and Inspection Act, Liquid Petroleum Gas Installation and Equipment Regulations, and all subsequent legislation.
- sponsored, with Halifax Regional Fire and Emergency Service, the third annual fire prevention symposium in November.
- provided information sessions and met with a number of agencies involved with the proposed natural gas pipeline as both a regulator and advisor on public safety and fire department preplanning.
- continued the regionalisation program for all deputy fire marshals by opening more offices.

Staff are studying other programs to provide a higher level of life safety in an effective and efficient manner.

EDUCATION

The Learn Not to Burn Committee continued introducing its program in Nova Scotia. The Child Care Foundation of Canadian Tire Incorporated helped the fire service and took part in special programs, such as the campaign to decrease fat fires. Fire departments, school teachers, day-care personnel, and the Department of Education and Culture are working together to introduce this program to school-aged children.

The Nova Scotia Accreditation Board was formed in 1997 to provide for certification of firefighters in Nova Scotia. The Board has representatives from the Fire Officers Association of Nova Scotia, Nova Scotia Firefighters School, Cape Breton Regional Fire Service and the Halifax Regional Fire and Emergency Service. The Board has applied for accreditation from the International Fire Service Accreditation Congress. The Board will delegate agencies to certify firefighters.

The L.P. Gas Board of Examiners has the responsibility to certify and advise on disciplinary matters for all those employed in the propane industry. The Board held 10 meetings and invigilated 526 examinations.

A committee has been formed with representation from various organizations to develop Occupational Health and Safety legislation for firefighters in conjunction with provincial legislation.

The Office provided training programs to industry, institutions, government and the fire service. Staff attended 21 fire service functions, held 56 meetings with fire chiefs, and took part in one public fire safety display.

ENGINEERING

The Office continues to provide plan examination and site visits for approving plans for building construction and propane and electrical installations. Many of the province's architects, engineers, building inspectors, and contractors rely on this service to ensure that they meet the requirements for fire and life safety in their buildings. Following is a breakdown of these activities.

This Office provides commentary and represents this province on a number of standard-writing organizations, including Commission on Building and Fire Codes, Canadian Standards Association, Underwriters' Laboratories of Canada, Underwriters' Inc., Canadian Gas Association and the Standards Council of Canada. The standards these and other similar organizations develop form a critical component of public fire safety.

ENFORCEMENT

To ensure compliance with legislation, the Office carries out inspections by request, complaint, and by audit. Staff investigate fires or explosions that appear to have been caused by illegal action or action that contravenes the Fire Prevention Act, or to assist a local authority. The Office prosecuted individuals during the past year for failure to comply with an order under the Fire Prevention Act.

There were 137 fires with a monetary loss of \$2,282,371 attributed to arson or suspected incendiary fires. This was down from \$1,109,380 and 150 fires in the previous year.

INJURIES AND LOSS OF LIFE

Despite the efforts of our fire protection system, 10 lives were lost: 2 men and 4 women and 4 children. Injuries were reported for 15 civilians and 14 firefighters.

PROPERTY LOSS

The recorded fire loss for the year was \$14,151,583, the result of 1,425 reported fires. This compares with losses of \$14,215,893 and 1,882 fires in the previous year, a decrease of half of one per cent in dollar loss and a decrease of 24 per cent in fires.

The major known causes of fire were:

- heating equipment—410 fires and \$2,431,911 in losses
- cooking equipment—96 fires and \$1,134,412 losses
- vehicle-electrical—16 fires and \$521,658 in losses
- electrical distribution—92 fires and \$1,472,170 in losses

There were 447 fires of an undetermined nature. This accounted for \$6,376,133 or 45 per cent of our monetary losses and 31 per cent of our reported fires.

SUMMARY

The per capita loss was \$15.06, which represents an increase of \$0.04 from the previous year. Every home should be protected by a working smoke detector or alarm, and every business should protect its resources with fire protection equipment, including sprinklers. Every citizen should be educated to prevent fire and to escape its path. Every firefighter should be provided with the training and equipment required to face the worst possible situations.

My sincere appreciation goes to the provincial fire service, industrial fire brigades, the Canadian Armed Forces, and all other fire prevention and fire protection services for their co-operation throughout the year. I thank the municipal authorities, the insurance industry, the Insurers' Advisory Organization, Insurance Crime Prevention Bureau, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, all municipal police forces, and the media for their continued co-operation and efforts.

I thank the people of Nova Scotia who in many ways assist in fire prevention and protection and who support their local fire service.
