

Findings and Decision- Renewal Application of Apaqtaukewaq Fisheries Co-op Limited for AO#1229

1. Overview:

On September 13, 2016, the Nova Scotia Department of Fisheries and Aquaculture (NSDFA) received an application from Apaqtaukewaq Fisheries Co-op Limited to renew Aquaculture Licence and Lease #1229 (AQ#1229), as described below:

2. History

AQ#1229 was first issued on March 7, 2002 for a ten year term (January 1, 2002 to January 1, 2012). AQ#1229 was renewed on December 14, 2011 for a five year term (January 2, 2012 to January 1, 2017).

3. Procedure

3.1 Performance Review

A performance review of the information submitted by the operator in support of their renewal application was completed. This review recommended that the site be renewed based on the technical and biological assessment. This performance review is required pursuant to Subsection 72(c) of the Aquaculture Licence and Lease Regulations, and was completed on January 24, 2017.

3.2 Public Comment Period

Notice of the application for the renewal of AQ#1229 for the 30-day public comment period was published on NSDFA's website (<http://novascotia.ca/fish/aquaculture/public-information/>) for the period of February 9, 2017 to March 10, 2017. Notice of the application was also published in the Royal Gazette Part I on February 8th, 15th, 22nd and March 1st.

3.3 Submissions

Zero submissions were received by NSDFA during the 30-day public comment period.

4. Factors to be considered

AQ#1229 is located in waters which are MSX positive; as such, there has been no production on this site for a number of years. On-going efforts to address the issue of MSX in the Bras d'Or Lakes could lead to AQ#1229 coming into full production. Oyster aquaculture is an important sector of the Nova Scotia aquaculture sector, and AQ#1229 coming into production would have a positive impact on the local and provincial economy.

The performance review and subsequent public comment period did not note the presence of other fishery activities in the area of the site. There were no ecological concerns identified in the past performance of this site with respect to negative impacts on other fisheries. AQ#1229 is authorized for the bottom cultivation of shellfish without gear, and as such there is no gear permitted within the boundaries of the lease which mitigates concerns pertaining to navigation. Section 55 of the *Licence and Lease Regulations* requires an aquaculture licence holder to mark each of their sites in a manner determined by the Minister (see below) and keep each site marked during the term of their licence.

AQ#1229 is located in the nearshore environment to the south of Indian Island. The licence and lease documents for AQ#1229 will allow for access to the site by the general public for recreational activities, provided that the public does not harvest the product on site. This clause serves to reduce potential interference with other users. AQ#1229 is licensed to cultivate shellfish species, and as such there is no evidence that shellfish aquaculture has impacts on the sustainability of wild salmon. The closest aquaculture site to AQ#1229 is AQ#1230, which is approximately 30 metres to the southeast of AQ#1229. There are nine other bottom culture shellfish sites within 2.0 km of AQ#1229. There is no evidence to suggest that the extent of existing aquaculture in the harbour has exceeded the carrying capacity of the harbour.

5. Decision

Based on the considerations above, Aquaculture Licence #1229 shall be renewed for a period of 10 years (January 1, 2017 to January 1, 2027) and Aquaculture Lease #1229 shall be renewed for a period of 20 years (January 1, 2017 to January 1, 2037).

The Licence and Lease documents shall be prepared in accordance with the standard operating documents of NSDFA, and shall be made publically available subject to the provisions of the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act*.

6. Conditions

In addition, the following condition shall apply:

The operator shall adhere to the following site marking requirements:

- a) mark all corners of the leased site with cautionary yellow buoys of a minimum of 60 cm in diameter;
- b) mark all corners of the leased bottom with a cement block or similar device of a weight sufficient to ensure the cement block or device remains in place at all times; and
- c) display the licence or lease number at 1 corner of the licensed or leased area.
