Liquor Licensing Regulations—amendment

Order in Council 2017-16 dated January 24, 2017
Amendment to regulations made by the Governor in Council
pursuant to Section 50 of the *Liquor Licensing Act*

The Governor in Council on the report and recommendation of the Minister of Service Nova Scotia dated November 21, 2016, and pursuant to Section 50 of Chapter 260 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1989, the *Liquor Control Act*, is pleased to amend the *Liquor Licensing Regulations*, N.S. Reg. 365/2007, made by the Governor in Council by Order in Council 2007-445 dated August 17, 2007, to enable the sale of up to two drinks of liquor in a licensed eating establishment without the requirement to purchase food, in the manner set forth in Schedule “A”, attached to and forming part of the report and recommendation, effective on and after January 24, 2017.

Schedule “A”

**Amendment to the *Liquor Licensing Regulations*
made by the Governor in Council under Section 50 of
Chapter 260 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1989,
the *Liquor Control Act***

Section 59 of the *Liquor Licensing Regulations*, N.S. Reg. 365/2007, made by the Governor in Council by Order in Council 2007-445 dated August 17, 2007, is amended by repealing subsection (1) and substituting the following subsection:

- (1) Except as provided in Section 58B, an eating establishment licensee may sell or serve liquor to a customer in their licensed premises, other than the part designated as a holding area under Section 72, only if
- (a) the customer is served enough food to constitute a meal; or
 - (b) the customer is served no more than 2 servings of liquor, as prescribed by subsection 50A(2), and the eating establishment licensee’s kitchen is operational and food service is available.
