## **Greetings from the FRPA Review Office!**

The 2015-2016 FRPA Annual Report will soon be tabled in the NS legislature. The Annual Data that Nova Scotia regulators provide to the FRPA Review Office enables us to identify progress made and areas for improvement. We used the data from 2015 to develop a high level, baseline analysis of registration practices in Nova Scotia and look

forward to sharing the results.

The Review Office has initiated a review of the FRPA legislation as required by the Act, as well as an evaluation of the policies, processes and programs that support its implementation. NS regulators will receive an update on the project at the upcoming FRPA breakfast meeting (Sept. 27, 2017) and be consulted throughout planning and implementation phases. The goal of the review of the legislation and program evaluation, is to assess the implementation and impact of the Act and ensure fair-access legislation in Nova Scotia is effectively achieving government's goals.

The Conference Board of Canada's (CBoC) report on Canadian immigration governance — "A New Era: Canadian Immigration Governance in the 21st Century"—has just been released and is attached to the FRPA Newsletter. The report asks: which immigration responsibilities are better being managed by the federal government, provinces and territories? What are the benefits and challenges of Canada's shared approach to selecting and settling immigrants? CBoC's answers to these questions may (or may not!) surprise you.

# Labour Mobility and International Qualification Recognition (IQR) Update

The Mobility & Qualification Recognition Working Group is preparing resource documents to support the transition from the Agreement on Internal Trade (AIT) to the Canadian Free Trade Agreement (CFTA), which will come into effect on July 1, 2017. While there are no significant differences in new Chapter 7 of the CFTA, the working group will provide a summary of the changes as well as update the current resources, including:
