Greetings from the FRPA Review Office!

We are happy to announce that the 2016-2017 FRPA Annual Report is available on the-FRPA website. Through the FRPA review process, data provided by regulatory bodies enables us to analyze registration practices over time, track trends, identify areas for improvement and report to the Minister of the Department of Labour and

Advanced Education on implementation of the FRPA. Submissions for the 2017 FRPA Annual Data Survey were due on February 15th. Please report late submissions, issues with the FRPA web application and requests for new passwords to Guifang Liu at <u>Guifang.liu@novascotia.ca</u>).

There are two separate surveys on the FRPA website: 1) The Annual Data survey tracks information about the number of applicants for the previous calendar year, and needs to be completed by every regulatory body every year; 2) The FRPA Review questionnaire asks qualitative questions about a regulatory body's registration practices and only needs to be completed when requested by the FRPA Review Office for the regulatory body's initial Review report, or 2-year Progress report. The Spring 2018 round of FRPA Reviews was launched on Feb. 14th for 7 regulatory bodies.

Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) Update

The following projects recently submitted to the RPL Program have been approved for funding:

 Nova Scotia Career Development Association (NSCDA) Certification Program Review and Quality Assurance Framework-NSCDA

This project will review the NSCDA's Quality Assurance Framework and supporting Operational Plan to ensure that the Nova Scotia Certified Career Development Practitioner Certification meets its intended outcomes.

 Understanding the Context: An Orientation for Internationally Educated Teachers-Immigrant Services Association of Nova Scotia

This project responds to the need for profession specific orientation support for internationally educated teachers (IET) by developing an online orientation resource to introduce IETs to the Canadian educational system and teaching profession, with a focus on Nova Scotia.

Recognized Prior Learning Process for Level 2
 Classification (Early Childhood Education (ECE))

 Phase 1-Nova Scotia Child Care Association

This project, intended to address labour market shortages of trained Early Childhood Educators in the province, will involve the development of a competency standard and competency assessment process for ECEs who have completed an approved college program (Level 2 Classification).
