2010-2011 French-language Services Plan**

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1. Message from the Deputy Minister

We are pleased to present the 2010-2011 French-language Services Plan for the Department of Labour and Workforce Development. This is the second such report from Labour and Workforce Development and we have carried forward the momentum generated from the 2009/2010 French-language Services Plan, and the progress achieved in the delivery and implementation of French-language services in prior years. We are committed to building on existing capacity to provide services in French to meet the needs of the Acadian and francophone communities.

We are committed to working collaboratively with the Office of Acadian Affairs (OAA) to enhance the Department's capacity to deliver French-language services. Priorities for 2010-2011 include:

- increase the number of French-language publications, especially in areas outside the scope of the Labour Market Agreement (LMA) and Labour Market Development Agreement (LMDA)
- increase employee awareness of the department's commitment to provide French-language services, and promote interest and involvement in service delivery;
- continue to explore opportunities to address Acadian and francophone community needs and continue to build upon our successes;
- continue to build departmental capacity to provide service in French through employee training in the French language.

We have established a measure of overall compliance with the French-language Service Plan at 80% or greater in 2010-2011.

In 2009/2010, we:

- wrote and implemented Labour and Workforce Development's first French-language Service Plan
- were represented on the French-language Services Coordinating Committee and the Acadian Employability Table
- worked with l'Université Sainte Anne(USA) and L'Equipe Alphanetisation to provide quality adult education
- hired an Acadian Coordinator to ensure our French language services continue to increase.

The progress we have made this past year, and the goals and objectives we have set for this coming year, will ensure that LWD continues to increase and deliver programs and services that reflect the needs of the Acadian and francophone community in Nova Scotia.

2. Responses to French Requests (Written and Oral)

LWD will continue to respond to written and verbal requests from the public for French-language services, in a timely manner. Various French-speaking staff members have offered to provide services in the French language. Some staff answer the telephone in both English and French (Hello / Bonjour). We have bilingual staff throughout the province willing and able to provide service in French. Staff members who receive requests beyond their capacity to provide a response in French have been instructed to contact French-speaking staff members for help.

Some of the Chairs or Deputy Chairs of our Agencies, Boards and Commissions can conduct hearings in French. Also, if applicants or witnesses need a French interpreter, that is provided free of charge. In addition, the Conciliation and Labour Tribunals Division has an agreement in place with New Brunswick for conciliation in French where workplace parties request it.

Publications can be translated upon the request of the originating Division. If the material requested is technical in nature, the staff member is asked to forward the English version to the French-language Services Coordinator to request written translation by the OAA.

3. French-language Services Inventory

Labour and Workforce Development provides a wide range of services and publications available in French. Appendix A has more information.

4. Labour and Workforce Development Steps To Improve Our French-Language Services for 2010-2011

Labour and Workforce Development developed a comprehensive plan, along with relevant goals and objectives, which aims to further improve our services in French. This plan continues our efforts to increase and deliver programs and services that reflect the needs of the Acadian and francophone community.

Appendix B details those goals and objectives.

5. Progress in Reaching Goals and Objectives for 2009-2010

Labour and Workforce Development made great progress in improving its French-language services in 2009-2010. Appendix C lists:

- the goals and objectives we established for 2009-2010 to improve French-language services;
- the actions and activities we set to meet the goals and objectives for 2009-2010; and
- the progress we made last year to reach our goals and objectives.

Overall, 19 of the 23 Planned Measures from 2009-2010 were accomplished, for an 83 percent success rate.

6. Conclusion: Contribution to the Preservation and Growth of the Acadian and Francophone Community

Labour and Workforce Development's French-language Services Plan contributes to the preservation and growth of the Acadian and francophone community by allowing us to serve French-speaking community members in their native language. This engages the Acadian and francophone community more fully in the planning and delivery of our operations and programs.
