## *"Smokey's Burning Message"*



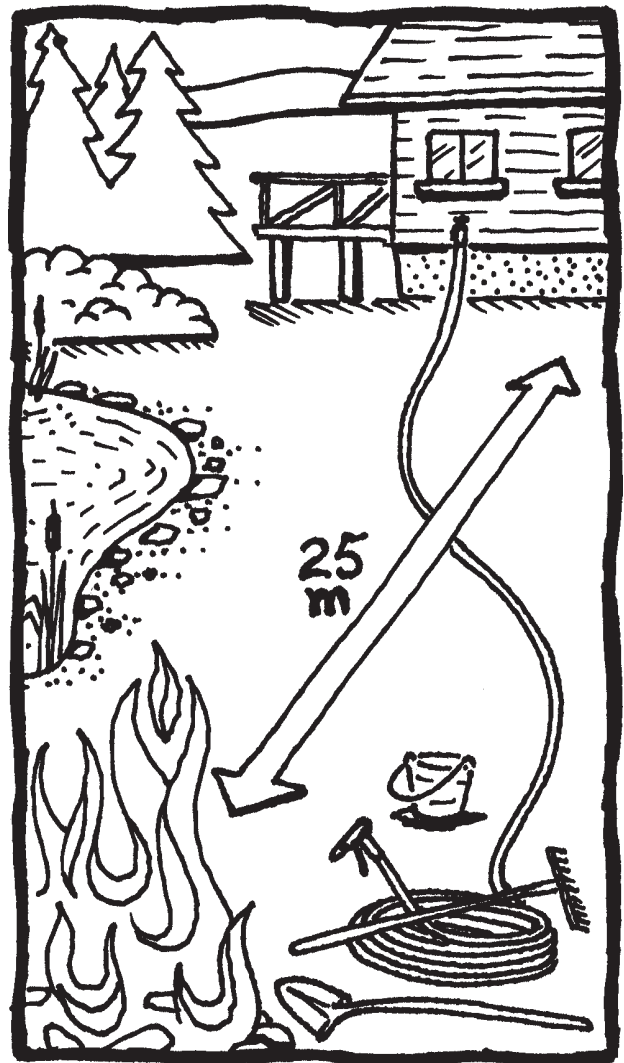

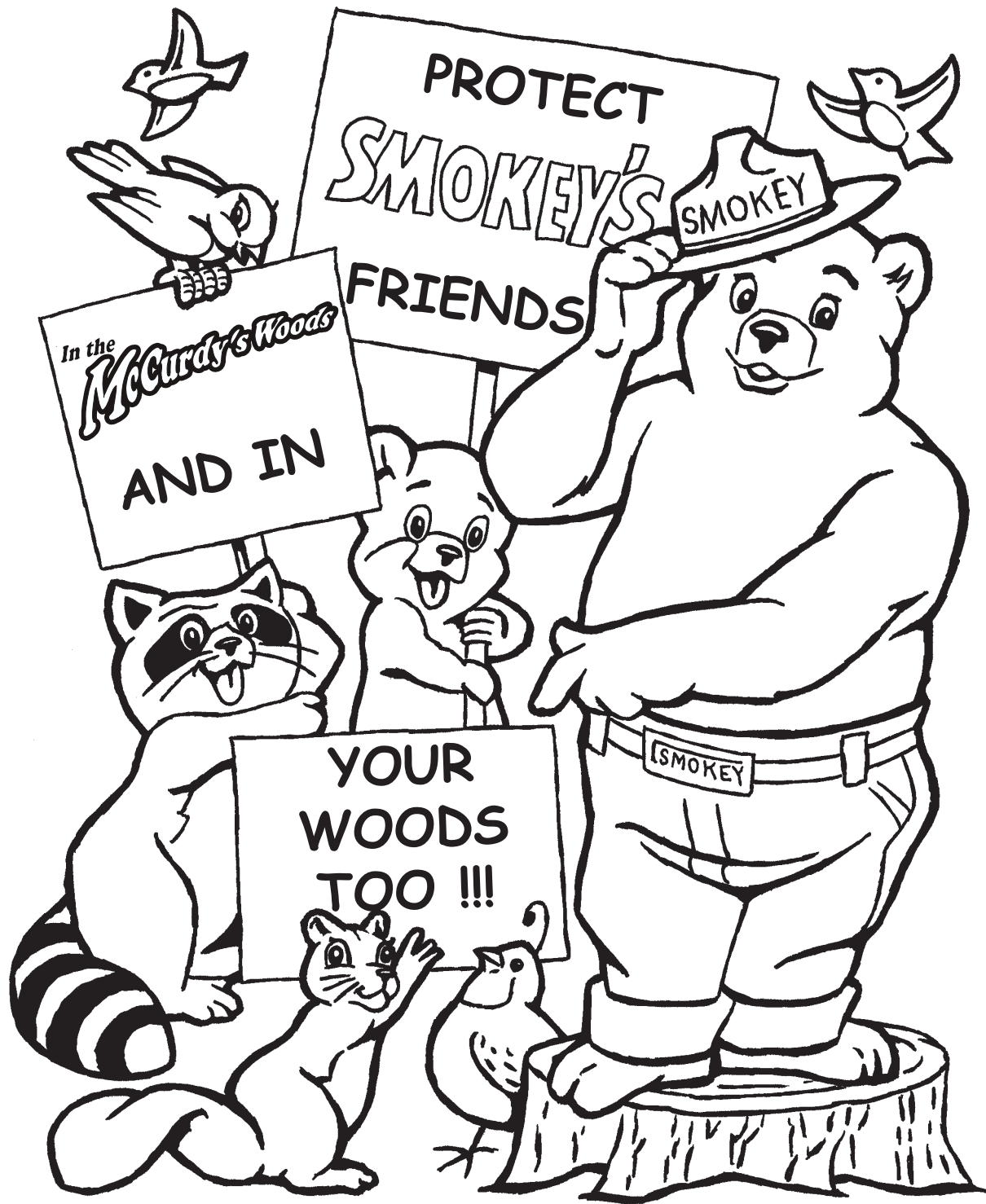


I keep thinking back to that special visit we had during the last week of school. A woman named Amy came to our classroom. She said she was a Forest Technician, and that part of her job was to fight forest fires. I was really surprised by all of the cool things she did, and I keep thinking that maybe that is something I might like to do when I got older. It was really exciting when Smokey joined her that day in our classroom. Since Smokey was a bear, he wasn't able to talk, but Amy said he had a special message for us about burning. There are some important things to do before we start to burn brush. We'll need to get a burning permit from the local Department of Natural Resources office; remove all vegetation within 3 m of where the brush fire is going to be; make sure the fire is located at least 25 m away from the cottage or trees; keep fire fighting tools on hand (a charged garden hose, shovel, rake and bucket); and soak the ashes well with water after the fire is out.



Boy, there sure is a lot to think about, but the forests are worth all the extra planning. I sure hope Mom and Dad don't think I'm being too careful. I know Gram will be on my side; she loves to see the green forests and all the special creatures that live there. We will just have to work together to make sure that everyone remembers what Smokey has been trying to tell us for decades "Only You Can Prevent Forest Fires".
