

General Guidelines for Treasure Trove Applicants

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Introduction

The *Treasure Trove Act* was enacted in 1954 to manage the exploration for and recovery of precious stones or metals in a state other than their natural state, or any treasure or treasure trove. Management of these materials emphasizes careful and methodical recovery, which respects the archeological integrity of the site(s) being examined. Proponents are required to either obtain a Heritage Research Permit from the Nova Scotia Museum or a letter from the Curator of Special Places stating that such a permit is not required.

For sites located in the offshore, the Receiver of Wrecks (*Canada Shipping Act*) will attempt to establish rightful ownership of the material recovered from ship wrecks. In addition, the federal government's *Navigable Waters Protection Act* requires that there is no disruption to shipping as a result of activities licensed under the *Treasure Trove Act*.

The Process

- (1) **Application Fees** - \$560.50 (Cheques payable to Minister of Finance)
- (2) **Application and Work Proposal** - Applications are to be in the form of a letter addressed to the Registrar of Mineral and Petroleum Titles. The area of interest is to be identified by the mineral rights grid: map, tract, claim. A description of the mineral rights grid is contained in the online guide titled *A Guide to Mineral Exploration Legislation in Nova Scotia* (<http://www.gov.ns.ca/natr/meb/pdf/ic58.asp>). Maps may be obtained from the Registry of Mineral and Petroleum Titles. The work proposal is to outline the type and duration of work planned. Generally, work proposals are organized by year (example: Year 1, Year 2). Licences may be issued for different terms depending on the work proposal to a maximum of two (2) years.

- (3) Treasure Trove applicants are required to obtain a Heritage Research Permit or a letter from the Curator of Special Places stating that a Heritage Research Permit is not required.

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- (4) Landowner permission is required.
- (5) When the application is complete, it is forwarded to the Minister of Natural Resources for the consideration of the Executive Council. If accepted, a Treasure Trove Licence is prepared for issuance by the Minister. If material (precious stones or metals in a state other than their natural state, or any treasure or treasure trove) is recovered, a royalty is to be paid. Generally, a 10% royalty is paid “in kind,” and may involve negotiations between the licensee, the Curator of Collections for the Nova Scotia Museum, and Department of Natural Resources.
