

Project Goals and Objectives

- Build a nesting platform that requires little maintenance and is durable.
- Build a couple of different designs to see what works best.
- Identify areas where these platforms are likely to be inhabited.
- Seek out volunteers with the resources to help members install and monitor platforms from a distance via game cameras/binoculars.

Project Goals and Objectives

- Provide our clubhouse to store material and to facilitate the building of these nesting platforms.
- Educate the public the rationale behind this project
- Inform the public the importance of not disturbing wildlife in any way, shape or forum. Even a single, seemingly quiet visit can disturb and disrupt the nesting practice and further create stress on nesting fowl of any species. If you see nesting Loons assume you are doing harm and leave immediately.
- Record results for the Habitat Fund, DFO, DOE and the public.

Assessment of Achievements, Lessons Learned, Measured Against Project Goals and Objectives.

Our goal of providing nesting platforms for the Common Loon was hampered because we were late getting funding. We did accomplish assembling platforms and having some in place that the birds showed some interest in. We had lots of public engagement with sightings but few reported seeing chicks. Those who did report sightings and our observations of sightings revealed that there were actual chicks being born but being lost very quickly to aerial predators. We plan to add some sort of canopy protection to the platform next year. Our goal is to have these platforms in the water next year as soon as the ice is off the water.

Recommendations for Follow-up Steps


Our recommendation if we had any control over it would be to have the funding available much sooner than is the present norm. It seems that bureaucracy plays a big role in this funding being distributed. Most projects being funded are time sensitive and access to this funding should be made available ASAP after the BOD meeting in February.





BROWN BAT HOUSE PROJECT

The Port Morien Wildlife Association has with financial support from the Nova Scotia Habitat Conservation Fund engaged in two projects in the Industrial Cape Breton area. The funds for these grants come from contributions by **Hunters and Transpare** in Nova Scotia

Brown Bats in North America are dying by the Millions as a result of what's called the White Nose Syndrome, a fungus that causes the Bats to wake early from hibernation and end up starving to death as a result of food shortage. We have built Bat Houses that have been erected and we have engaged the public in an attempt to locate and study bats in this area to see if this disease is prevalent in this area. This disease has been recorded in 5 Provinces and 29 States since first being discovered in 2009 with over 5 million bats dying as a result of this.

Anyone with knowledge of bat sightings are asked to contact any member of our organization. If you happen to find a dead bat or bats, you should notify the NS Department of Natural Resources. Bats acknown to be associated with the Rabbis disease and there is a Public Health Notice on the web addressing procedures to follow if you find a dead bat. Bats are known to eat four to five times their body weight in insects each night. They play a very important role in our ecosystem.

LOON PLATFORM NESTING PROJECT

The other project we took on this year was a Floating Loon Nesting Project. Loon reproduction it seems is down and some contributing factors have been identified as rising/fluctuating water level, land development encroachment, lead and mercury poisoning and the ever present predator attacks. We were late getting started this year and the loons were after already nesting so we concentrated on finding locations and building platforms for installation next year. We had lots of engagement from the public with regards to Loon sightings but very few reported sering new chicks. We are hoping these platforms will get them away from shore predators and the fluctuating water woes they face. We have a very good relationship with the CBRM Water Utility who has given us permission to study this situation in watershed areas. We have many other projects we are involved with throughout CBRM.

Anyone with an interest in the great outdoors are welcome to join our organization. Membership dues are \$10.00 per year and we meet the second Wednesday of each month.
