#### Rouge Fatale

Known as the legendary drag performer of Atlantic Canada, Rouge Fatale has a heart as big as her mouth! She holds a plethora of awards under her wig including The Coast's Entertainer of the Year and Most Halifamous Person for 2019-2020. Rouge is also known as the first entertainer in Canada to have a successful 4-year residency with Casino Nova Scotia hosting her show Rouge Fatale & Friends. She has also been a member of the fundraising society, ISCAN for 20 years.



#### Jenna Robar & Tehya Milliea

Jenna is an accredited Holistic Health Coach, passionate speaker, and a traditional hand-drummer and singer. Jenna carries the title of 'National Ambassador of Hope' with Canadian organization 'We Matter', frequently travelling across Canada to speak to Indigneous youth on life promotion. Seasoned in speaking up for what she believes in, she has spoken and drummed in the House of Commons, with the United Nations Association of Canada, in schools and universities on behalf of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada, and with YMCA locations across the country.

Tehya represents the Millbrook First Nation and is a grade 12 student attending CEC High. She has been dancing since she could walk and performs the Fancy Shawl dance. Having roots in a ceremonial dance called the Butterfly Dance, the shawl is meant to symbolize the wings of a butterfly.



#### Halifax Multicultural Drummers

Halifax Drummers (AKA The Malaria Warriors) are family drummers devoted to carry on their baby sister's memory. The group was founded by Dr. Olugu Ukpai after he lost his 16-month-old daughter "Goodness" to malaria, unnecessarily in 2016. The family drums to raise funds and create awareness across schools and communities. They were the local stars at the 2018 Tattoo and received the HEROES & LEGENDS recognition from the Canadian armed forces. The Multicultural Drummers are also the recipient of the 2022 volunteer youth award for Halifax. Malaria is a poverty disease. Every 35 seconds, a child under 5 dies of malaria needlessly. No child should be left to die of malaria no matter where the child comes from. "We cannot forget those children we left behind. Let's drum up hope, smiles and support for them".



#### Pranitha Vattoni

Pranitha has been learning Bharatanatyam, a South Indian dance form since the age of 3. Born and raised in Kerala, she first started training in the Kalamandalam style of Bharatanatyam for 5 years. At the age of 10, she started training with Shri. Hari Das in the Tanjavur style. She completed her arangettam, at Guruvayoor temple in Thrissur, Kerala in 2012. She continued to train under Shri. Hari Das for two more years until she moved away for university in 2014. In university, she was active with the Fine Arts club and involved in various cultural events. She moved to Halifax in 2019 and has been expanding her horizons in dance since then. She now attends classes at the Daldance society in Dalhousie University and House of Eights dance studio. She has also started teaching dance through the Daldance society and hopes to grow much more as a dancer.

For more than 10 years Amanda Benoit has been the Post-Secondary and Student Engagement Coordinator for Potlotek First Nation, guiding youth on their journey toward a post-secondary education. She has logged many hours to help students apply for university, with tutoring, accessing technology and hosting cooking classes. One student said, "the most meaningful thing Amanda has done for me, while I was away at school, was to talk me through my anxiety when it got too bad." That student, with help from Amanda, graduated last year. Amanda is a beacon of hope and love and is the very essence of a volunteer and Potlotek First Nation is very proud to have her in our community.

#### Bernard, Pauline Membertou First Nation

At 91, Pauline involves herself in the community as an advisor specializing in traditional ceremonies and translation work, sharing her knowledge in Mi'kmaw language and culture. Throughout her life, Pauline has involved herself in Indigenous educational organizations at local, provincial, regional, and federal levels, including the Membertou Education Committee, the Provincial Education Committee through the Union of Nova Scotia Indians, the National School Committee, and the National Indian and Eskimo Education Association. She has volunteered for the local church and schools, cultural and language programs, pow-wows, St. Vincent de Paul, restorative justice, and elder and youth programs. She continues to be an active member of the Membertou Heritage Park Advisory Committee and Working Committee.

#### Burke, Lorne

#### Cape Breton Regional Municipality

Lorne has been the driving force behind every football program in the CBRM dating back to the mid 1980s, giving thousands of hours of his time for more than 36 years. He has not only heled to create a successful football program but has also been a positive influence for thousands of youth. He has coached all age levels and currently coaches Sydney Academy's football team. No matter the weather, Lorne, his coaches, and players are running plays, having fun, and learning how teamwork can produce great results. He shows both first time athletes and veteran athletes the joy of football and that everybody is skilled whey they play as a team. CBRM has greatly benefitted from Lorne's volunteer efforts.

For many years, Joseph has played a large role in bringing sporting opportunities to Eskasoni. Since 2020, he has acted as a liaison for female hockey in our community working with the Blizzard Female Hockey organization as a board member. Joseph played a role in obtaining new boards for the rink and winning the Kraft Hockeyville 2022 in Sydney. He is always willing to offer a helping hand; from sharpening skates, getting on the ice to coach, coaching softball, driving youth to their games, assisting with grants, recruiting other volunteers or purchasing youth equipment with his own money. Joseph is someone that we can always rely on and is a vital asset for sports in our community.

## Guthro, Deacon Berkley Town of Port Hawksbury

Along with Deacon's church duties at St. Joseph's Church for the past 10 years, he visits the sick and shut-in at local hospitals and nursing homes. He also organizes a clothing and houseware depot for those in need, three times a year, as well as collecting and distributing school supplies for students in need. # Youth Volunteer of the Year Award

#### Megumi Ozawa Wentworth, NS

The Wentworth Learning Centre has always been a safe and inclusive place for Megumi. She started off volunteering for a few events such as jubilees and Christmas fairs then began to lead a series of educational day camps for schoolaged children and evening events for families. Megumi now works with people of all ages, from toddlers to senior citizens, through the Centre's intergenerational program which provides opportunity for youth and seniors to teach and learn from each other. Without Megumi's dedication and persistence, a lot of these programs would not be offered. Recently she implemented and lead a program she developed called the Girls Empowerment Camp. This is a free opportunity for young girls to explore their self-esteem, develop life skills, and to learn in an accepting and inclusive environment.

Megumi is also a volunteer with the Colchester Residential Services Society, an agency providing support to people with disabilities and was instrumental in developing their Youth Day Program. Volunteering in a community where many are marginalized and devalued, Megumi was able to lift-up and support those around her to discover their value and recognize themselves as part of the greater community. She ensures everyone has a place to learn in a way that suits their specific needs. No one is left out.

Megumi is a special force. Her passion, commitment, and dedication to learning cannot be matched. #### Nova Scotia Strong Award

### Ummah Masjid and Community Centre Halifax, NS

Representing over 40 different nationalities, the Ummah Masjid Community Centre (UMCC) is widely known in Nova Scotia as the heart of the Halifax Muslim Community. They have taken lead on multiple community and youth activities to establish the local Muslim community and build extensions to rural Nova Scotia.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, they took initiative on every front. The Centre provided rapid test kits to anyone in need of them, encouraged testing to the larger community and acted as a facility to provide vaccinations during the spread and peak of the pandemic. Dozens of volunteers cooked thousands of meals for front line-workers. In one month alone the Centre was able to feed 10,000 people hot meals, free of charge to all who came. They also

established the 24/7 program aimed at addressing the acute spike in domestic and mental health problems, during the pandemic. An unexpected benefit of the program was a more engaged and integrated community now boasting over 500 volunteers.

Working together on common interests in public safety and community support, UMCC has been a key advisor for Halifax Regional Police on the creation of a new unit dedicated to investigating hate crimes and incidents. As a training initiative, UMCC has welcomed HRP cadets to the mosque to discuss diversity and cultural awareness. UMCC also spearheaded the creation of Bill 12 which is now Bill No. 96, Dismantling Racism and Hate Act. This Act lays the foundation for Nova Scotia to create systems and policies aimed at eradicating forms of hate that would otherwise result in injustice and discrimination.

#### KG Ceramics

Kaashif Ghanie [he/him] is a mixed first-generation Guyanese Canadian Muslim Ceramic/Potter and Visual Artist working in Kjipuktuk/Halifax in the Wonderneath Art Society Ceramic Studio. He graduated from NSCAD University in the fall of 2015 with a bachelor's degree in ceramics and a minor in art history.

Kate Grey [she/her] is a Ceramic/Potter and Visual Artist working in Kjipuktuk/Halifax. Grey has her bachelor's degree in Ceramics from NSCAD University [2016] and an art history minor focusing on the history of craft. Grey is a white settler Canadian with ancestry from Denmark, England, Italy and Germany.

Together, Grey and Ghanie share a ceramic studio in Wonderneath Art Society. This is where they run KG Ceramics, a handmade pottery company. KG in the name is based on both their initials in their names.



Assalamu Alaykum (peace be upon you). For the Nova Scotia Strong Award, Kaashif Ghanie from KG Ceramics created an Alhambra Vase with an inscription on the base. The Alhambra Vase is a historical Islamic vessel shape which is seen either highly decorated with floral patterning or with textural glaze application. For the award, Ghanie decided to represent both the award winner, Ummah Masjid and Community Centre, with the historical Alhambra vessel shape and a colour glaze palette that signifies the shores of Mi'kma'ki/Nova Scotia. The vase is made from porcelain clay with iron impurities that give its speckled appearance. This award represents strength in the community in the space we occupy in Mi'kma'ki. Alhamdulillah (praise be to God) and Congratulations to the Ummah Masjid and Community Centre.
