Conomic Development Advisory \square Services this year have focused on the delivery of projects in association with the Economic Development Officers Network (EDON) and the Tripartite Economic Development Working Committee.

CMM provided professional development opportunities to Economic Development Officers in areas such as: Proposal and Report Writing, Computer Training and Financial Statements, As well, several EDOs were initiated into the CANDO (Council for the Advancement of Native Development Officers Organization) Community Economic Development (CED) certificate program in pursuit of professional designation.


In the area of human resource development, assistance continues to be this year and a tem available to member communities to help with job postings, position mandates and interviews. tion of the Post Secondary P

CMM participated in the planning of the Atlantic Aboriginal Economy Building Workshops held in April and November and facilitated the planning for the 2nd Aboriginal Business of Arts Conference held in June of 2000.

Advocacy continues for equitable First Nation participation in major provincial economic development opportunities such as natural gas (Sable, MNEP, Pan Canadian, Sempra), mining (Black Bull Resources), etc.

Delivery options for summer employment, Training Funds and Scholarships available through the First Nations/MNEP Agreement were explored. A discussion paper was prepared and is awaiting ratification by the Assembly of Nova Scotia Chiefs.

Year end projects in progress included the Aboriginal Tourism Strategy Initiative, development of a regional Aboriginal Tourism Association, the Mi'kmaq Nova Scotia First Net Initiative and discussion re: an Aboriginal Business Law Course.

EDUCATION

In the fall of 2000, CMM once again sponsored 52 students from Afton, Annapolis Valley, Bear River, Glooscap and Pictou Landing to attend post secondary institutions. As well, two Labrador Inuit students and one student from the North West Territories were assisted. Fifteen graduates are anticipated for the Spring of 2001.

Ten very deserving students were awarded scholarships this year through the Post Secondary Program. CMM also offered the first Sammy Gehue Scholarship from the Sammy Gehue Trust in recognition of outstanding scholastic achievement.

CMM's Education Director participated on the Management Committee to evaluate the Centre of Excellence and recommend future direction. A final report is ready to present to leadership.

The E12 Guidelines were reviewed this year and a template policy produced in an attempt to standardize the policy which governs the administration of the Post Secondary Program. After reviewing the template, the CMM Board opted to keep the CMM policy with no change.

Dalhousie University continues to be a busy spot with improved computer access for students, a Time Management Workshop, Counselling support service on various topics, employer visits, and the well attended monthly potluck dinners. Dalhousie University again sponsored a part-time assistant for the unit to help with the workload.

Under Education Reform, CMM accessed funding to identify community education needs and priorities for Afton, Millbrook, Glooscap and Bear River. A discussion paper was generated which identifies many barriers and priorities for improvement. Common issues included revival of the Mi'kmaq Language, special education needs, culturally appropriate learning materials, and Mi'kmaw presenters for the elementary schools. In response, CMM has proceeded to begin a Mi'kmaq Language Initiative and will have Mi'kmaw presenters available to the schools in September 2001. With a commitment from government to address the shortage of financial support for Special Education Needs, CMM anticipates a role in the administration and delivery of an enhanced program.

ENVIRONMENT

The Environmental Services
Program continued to provide
environmental advisory services to
member communities. Projects included completing environmental site
assessments for landfills in Bear River
and Pictou Landing, assisting Afton
and Pictou Landing remediate furnace
oil spills, and intervening on behalf of
the Afton First Nation in a proposed
composting operation.

Furnace oil tank inspections have been completed for all member communities. Final reports will be forwarded to each community providing an inventory of tanks, inspection schedules, maintenance schedules, codes for good practices and recommendations. Follow-up with each community is planned to discuss the reports and prepare oil tank management systems to help decrease the number of oil spills.

An increasing role for the program has been to work with the Federal and Provincial Governments and industry before and during environmental assessment processes. Efforts have been made to increase Mi'kmaq involvement in archaeological assessments, Mi'kmaq significant species surveys and other activities so that Mi'kmaq interests are addressed prior to decisions being made.

The Environmental unit undertook two major habitat restoration contracts with Maritimes Northeast this past year. Two brooks (one in Pictou County and another in Cumberland County) were restored and 1200 trees were planted along the Mainline between Truro and Goldboro. Workers from Afton and Pictou Landing were involved in these initiatives.

Three modules of the Environmental Tool Kit have been completed: Indoor Air Quality, Solid Waste Management and Petroleum Storage. Upon request, CMM intends to utilize these learning tools for community workshops.

CMM organized an Occupational Health and Safety Committee to ensure the operation meets all health and safety standards required by the Labour Code and provide a healthy environment for all employees.

Future activities include working with the Pictou Landing First Nation to develop a groundwater protection strategy which will include the development of an environmental bylaw, assisting Bear River to address various concerns regarding the adjacent Nova Scotia Power Lands, promoting relationships between Mi'kmaq and the Federal/Provincial Governments regarding environmental assessments and continuing work on a Mi'kmaq Environmental Assessment Protocol for ratification by the NS Chiefs.
