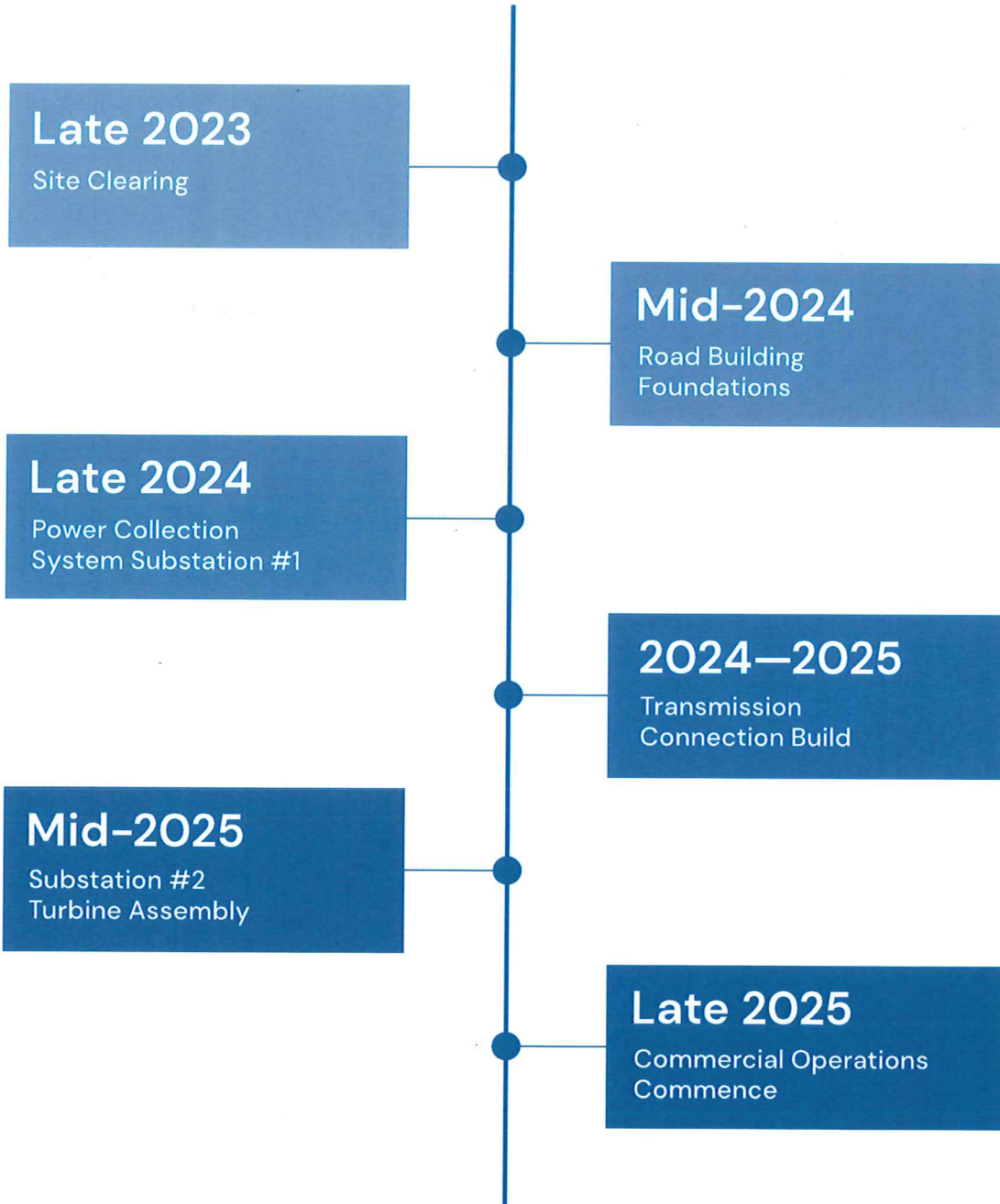




Project Construction Timeline

Port Hawkesbury Paper, through its sister company Port Hawkesbury Paper Wind (PHP Wind), is proposing to build a 130-megawatt (MW) wind farm on lands in Guysborough County that are currently under license to Port Hawkesbury Paper. The project will help reduce the [provinces facility's](#) carbon footprint and greenhouse gas emissions, as well as lower energy costs [for the facility's](#) and help ensure a long-term future for one of the region's largest employers.

This project is a key part of adding new renewable energy sources to the many solutions our province requires; it will help us reach the provincial goal of phasing out coal-produced electricity and getting to 80% renewables by 2030.

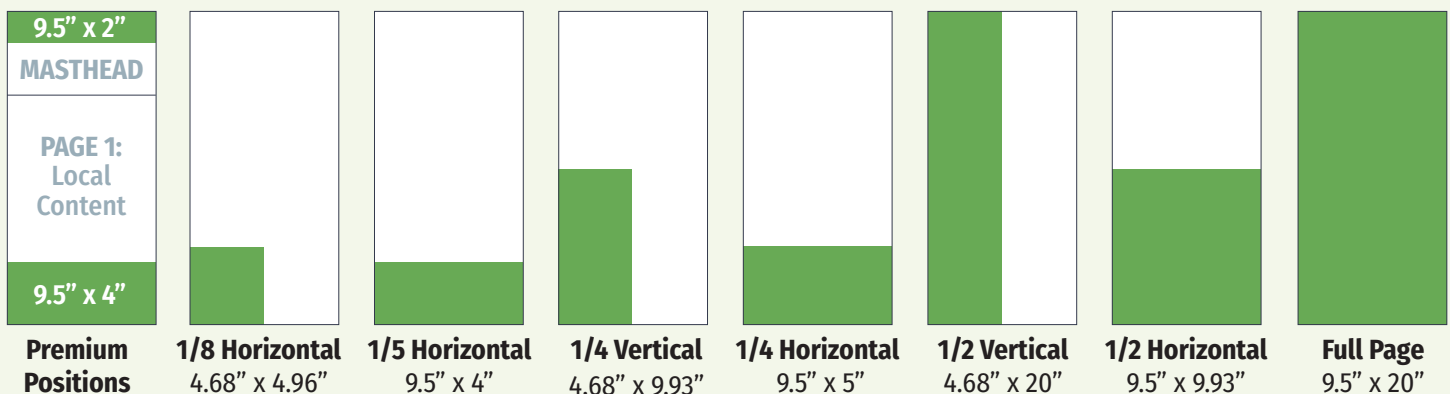

Take your board game beyond

There's a wide variety of themes and strategies for all ages

Colleen Hatcher and his family had always enjoyed gathering around the kitchen table for a game of crib or a classic board game like Monopoly.

But a fateful trip to the annual Hal-Con Sci-Fi, Fantasy and Comic Convention eight years ago tuned Hatcher into the true art and complexity of the board game.

"(There was) a room devoted strictly to board games," he said. "A massive library of games and volunteers who'd teach the game to you."

The event stoked a passion for games in Hatcher.

"I guess more of an addiction ... now, I own over 130 games," he said.

Step outside the influence of iconic games like Monopoly, Clue or Scrabble and the world of the board — or tabletop — game bursts with creativity, imagination and fun.

One of Hatcher's favourite games is Carcassonne, a tile-placement game set in medieval-era France where players achieve points by building roads, castles, monasteries and other landmarks.

Hatcher admits an irony in this COVID-19 age regarding another all-time favourite: Pandemic. Players work together to deal with several plagues hitting the world's population in an example of a co-operative game.

"You're assigned different roles (such as a medic) and you have to work together and make decisions together," he said. "It gets fun; you can get into super-heated arguments."

Patricio Garcia of Halifax,

who has collected games since 2012, is also an unbridled board game enthusiast.

Garcia's favourite games include Bus, in which players buy bus routes and transport as many passengers as possible, in what Garcia calls "a heavy strategy game." Another favourite is Scythe, set in an alternate-history version of the 1920s where people co-exist with high-tech machinery.

Garcia has amassed 542 games but that doesn't include expansions, which are available for some games to add items like game pieces, additional board space or ex-

tended game play.

"When you include expansions, I top out at 1,030," he said.

Dan Morton, manager of Midgard Gaming in Mount Pearl, Newfoundland and Labrador, said the pandemic forced him to pivot his business in a different direction. Pre-COVID, Midgard was more like a board game cafe where you could play a tabletop game or use one of 10 computers and six X-Boxes. But pandemic restrictions closed those options.

He ended up selling all the computers and X-Boxes and built up the retail side.

"A tangible thing people can take home and experience on their table," he said.

He said the pandemic forced people to interact more with those they live with and board games were a perfect way to do that. It was also a needed break from the computer screens during lengthy lockdowns and with work and school moving online.

Morton said the pandemic, plus higher costs for going out, has shown "it's OK to be at home and hanging out with people there. You still want to go out, but you don't necessarily want to do it all

the time."

Morton hopes to set up more regular monthly events and even a version of retreats held by some American game communities.

Back in Nova Scotia, Hatcher says he's missed gathering with other gamers during the past couple of years. He hopes this year's Hal-Con — which will run at full capacity for the first time since 2019 and is slated for October — will get people in the board game scene excited again.

"People that love board games, we're addicted."

Suzanne Milner, of Windsor, said before the pandemic, she'd host international students at her home with a game night once a week, complete with pizza and snacks.

"We always started with Yahtzee and then moved on to Clue and Scrabble," she said.

But the international students stopped coming due to the pandemic. It was months later when she decided to restart game night with a group of friends.

Milner enjoys the familiarity of old favourites like Monopoly and Yahtzee.

"Yahtzee can get pretty friggin' competitive," she said.

And, about Monopoly: "There's something about being a land baron in a game you can never do in life and you have bragging rights if you do well."

Milner is happy to once again play her favourite games with her friends.

"You don't have to go out and spend money to have fun. You don't have to do hair and makeup to play a board game."



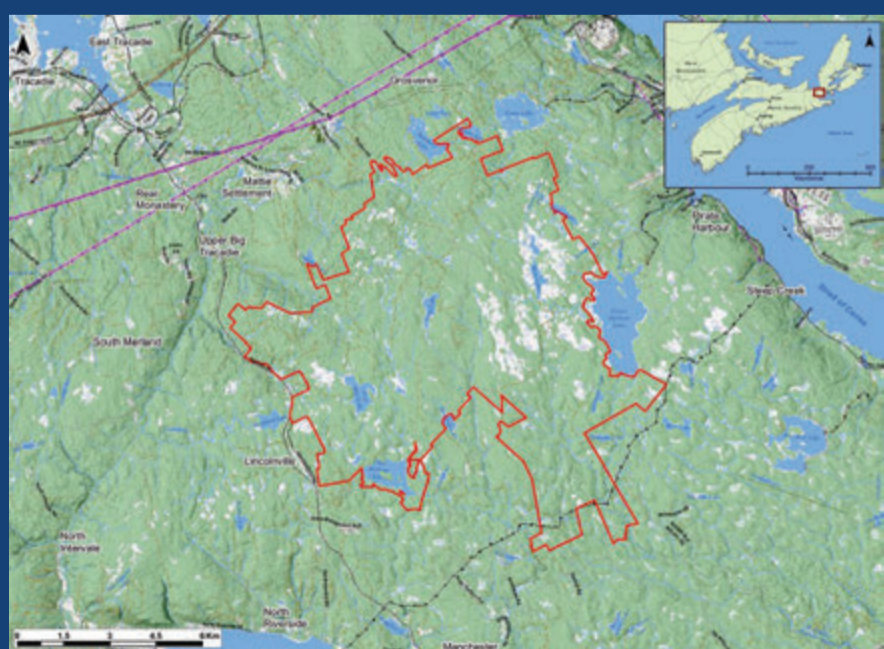

COUNCIL NOTES

MODG intends to amend land acknowledgment, maintains silence on landfill sale price

GUYSBOROUGH – At the regular monthly Municipality of the District Guysborough (MODG) council meeting on June 15, council passed a motion to start the process of changing a municipal by-law.

The amendment would add to the land acknowledgement read at the beginning of every council meeting in recognition that council is in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and unceded territory of the Mi'kma'ki People, and recognize the Blacks of Nova Scotia, whose

legacy and contribution dates back more than 400 years.

Councillor Hudson MacLeod, District 7, was the only councillor who voted against the motion. He explained that, while he supported the creation of the Black seat on council when it was created over 25 years ago, he wouldn't support the acknowledgement of one group over others that had also contributed to Nova Scotia.

In other business, Councillor Paul Long, District 1, asked to

speak about student employment this summer. He said, "At the waterfront we're trying to find students [as are] some of the other organizations around town...It's a hard job right now to find summer students here to work. We had five or six applications and there's only two now for three positions. The other ones said they already had jobs...there's a lot of jobs around just not a lot of students to fill them, unfortunately."

The MODG has faced similar issues this sum-

mer with only two applications for four student labourer positions.

Discussion around the council table indicated that university-aged students were not returning to fill summer jobs as they had a decade ago. Volunteer and non-profit organizations that had summer jobs for students now rely on high school students to fill positions.

Although not part of the discussion at council, the sale of the Guysborough Waste Management Facility (WMF) has been a topic of discussion in

the community since the MODG formerly announced it on June 7.

When council adjourned, MODG Warden Vernon Pitts had some comments on the sale of the WMF for the media.

Pitts said the MODG had contracts with various municipal units, and "These contracts are running out in a couple of years. We tried to start negotiations with our major contract. There was no dial tone, there was no pickup, no negotiations... they went out for expressions of interest in

regards to waste management services; that's disposal, collection, hauling – the whole nine yards. So, based upon that, it didn't look like they were coming this way. So, if we lose our largest client, it's no longer a viable business."

Near and long-term viability was one factor MODG considered when negotiating the sale, Pitts said, "But, that wasn't the only thing, another thing is diversion. Back when we first did the

St. Mary's council weighs options in face of high policing costs

ST. MARY'S – Council for the Municipality of the District of St. Mary's is questioning whether it can maintain its level of policing without more help from the provincial government.

The issue was raised

during a regular council meeting on June 13 after an extensive examination of the most recent Municipal Service Exchange Renegotiation (MSER) survey from the province, which was sent to local elected officials

for consideration last month.

The MSER, announced last fall, is designed to give local governments greater say over municipal spending priorities funded by the province, but St. Mary's

councillors wondered how much elbow room they actually have given the dramatic increase in the RCMP budget last year.

"I think that's something that definitely needs to be looked at,"

Warden Greg Wier said. "[It's] whether municipalities can maintain proper policing, [the costs of] which have gone up way more than the cost of living."

Last March, St. Mary's Director of

Finance Marian Fraser stunned councillors when she announced that the price for policing the municipality would rise by 11.04 per cent in 2022-23, an increase of

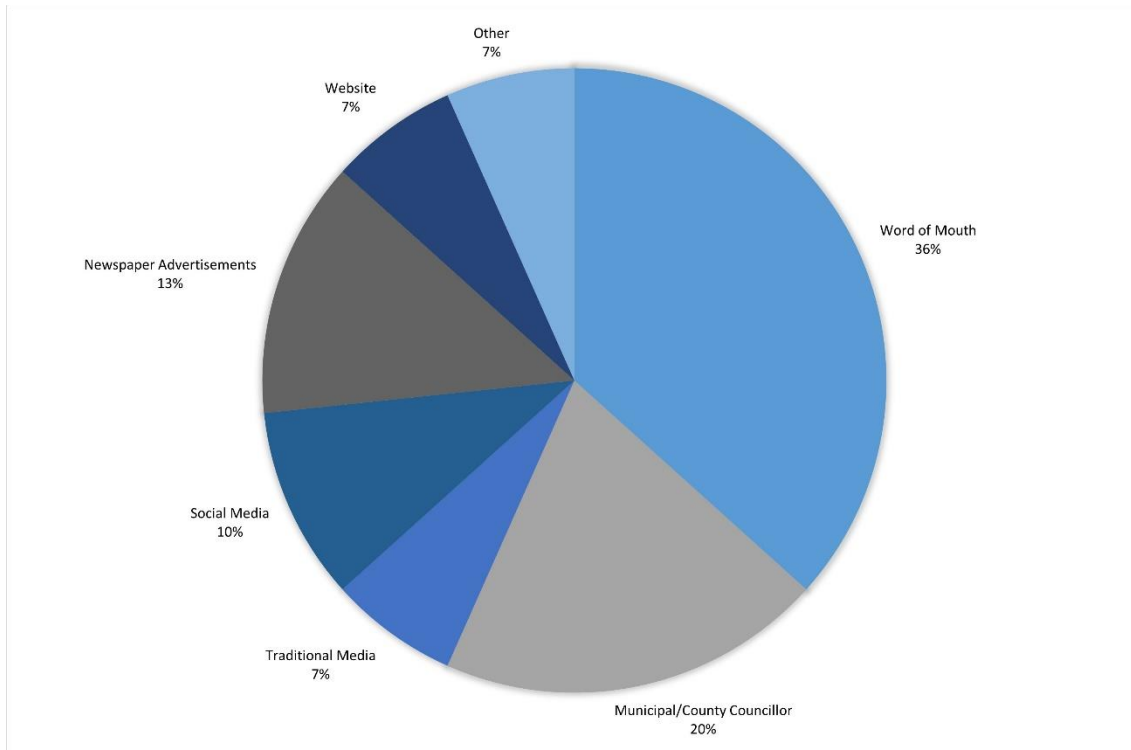

Exit Survey Summary Report

Port Hawkesbury Paper Wind Limited Partnership have held five Community Open Houses prior to EA registration. The goal was to provide information on the Project and answer any questions or concerns brought forward by community members.

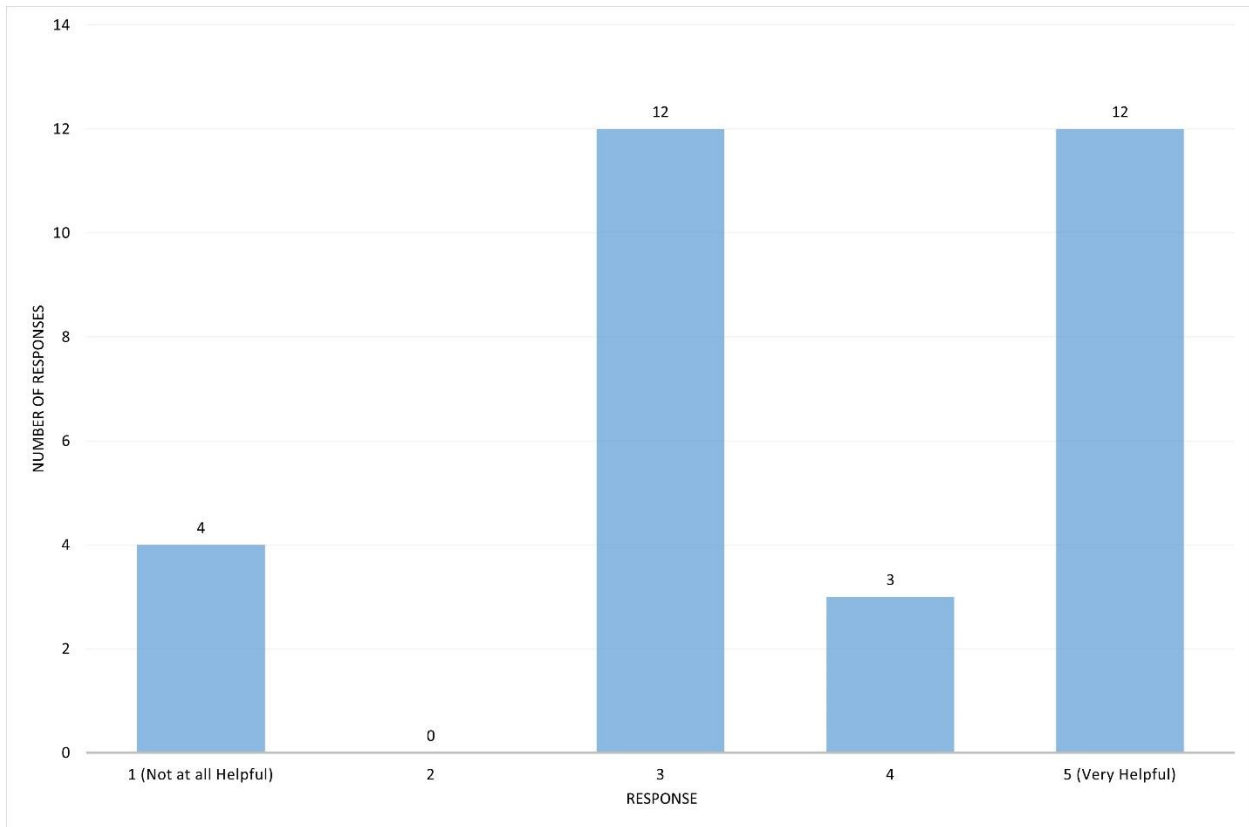
Open house #1 took place on Monday June 27, 2022, from 6-8 pm in the Lincolnville Community Hall. A total of 11 people attended this open house (Figure 6.1). Open house #2 was held on Wednesday, June 29, 2022, from 6-8 pm in St. Francis Harbor Hall; 12 people attended. Open house #3 was held on Monday, August 29, 2022, from 6-8 pm in the Lincolnville Community Hall; three people attended. Open house #4 was held on Tuesday, August 30, 2022, from 6-8 pm at the Auld's Cove Fire Hall; eight people attended. Open house #5 was held on Wednesday, August 31, 2022, from 6-8 pm at the Chedabucto Lifestyle Complex in the Town of Guysborough; five people attended. Participants were able to provide written feedback through an exit survey, a summary of which can be found below.

1. How did you hear about this event?



Most respondents (36%) learned about an open house by word of mouth; 20% attended as a result of their Municipal/County Councillor; 13% referenced seeing a newspaper advertisement; 10% found out via social media; 7% from traditional media; 7% from the Project website, and 7% learned by other means.

2. How helpful was the information you received?



39% of respondents (12 of 31 found the information was useful), while another 39% selected a neutral response. 13% of respondents (4 of 31) did not find the information useful.
