HOUSEHOLD HINTS:

Remove carpet stains with vodka. Rubbing alcohol, clear vodka (which has a lot of cleaning benefits!) and even white wine can be used for this cleaning hack. First blot the stain. Second, pour any type of clear alcohol (rubbing alcohol,

vodka, white wine) onto the stain. This is better than any over-the-counter product.

Eliminate water stains with shaving cream.

Who'd have thought that shaving cream could be used to clean? It is a great way to remove water stains from shower glass. Apply the shaving cream and let it sit for 15 minutes, then wipe off.

Baking soda and vinegar will basically clean the tub for you. [Mix] one cup vinegar, half a cup of baking soda with hot water and pour into [an empty] tub and allow to sit for five minutes. Start filling the tub with hot water until it is approximately one-quarter filled, and let it sit for an additional five minutes. Then drain and rinse thoroughly.

A DIY aromatherapy cleaning solution for shining sinks and tubs. Getting your sink or tub to shine by mixing baking soda, drops of lemon and basil essential oils and dish soap. Sponge the mixture on the surface of your bathtub and bathroom sink for 10 minutes. After rising off with water, [they] will be glistening.

Steam the microwave with lemon oil.

You can also use essential oils to clean the microwave.

"Add 15 drops of lemon essential oil into one and a half cups water to a microwave-safe bowl, and microwave on high for five to 10 minutes, allowing the steam to condense on inside walls/ceilings of your machine. Once complete, simply wipe away the softened food with a sponge.

DIY Glass Cleaner

If you don't feel like running to the store for more glass cleaner, making your own is easy. Mix white vinegar, distilled water, drops of essential oil and shake. This is an affordable and easy way to clean your windows, mirrors or even shower doors if you're in a pinch.

Baking soda for a hands-off stovetop scrub

Hails baking soda as a favorite stove-top cleaner.

Just pour it on, sprinkle with water, let sit one hour and wipe.

Remove pet hair with rubber gloves

When your standard vacuum doesn't seem to get all your pet's hair, rubber gloves will get the job done. Just slide them on and rub down any areas that need extra cleaning. When rubber is pushed against fabric, it can generate elasticity to gather remaining pet hair. Rinse the gloves under running water when you're done and the hair will unstick.

Eliminate foul odors from upholstery

Wiping out pet smells and other odors from the upholstery by combining vinegar, water, and your favorite essential oil (he vouches for lavender). Furniture is often the culprit behind persistent unpleasant smells in the home, as upholstery often retains odors. Pre-test the solution on an inconspicuous location and allow to dry to test for colorfastness before using on the rest of the upholstery. If all is good, then spray the mixture on the rest of the upholstery, and once dry, vacuum the area.

Spruce up the mattress with baking soda & vinegar

It's important to clean your mattress often to avoid dust mites, dead skin cells. For stain removal especially, try spraying the mattress with vinegar and sprinkle baking soda over the top. You can place a towel over the area and let it sit for one to two hours. Then take your vacuum and go over the mattress for a final clean.



Volunteer efforts ensure beauty of Chapel Gully Trail continues to be enjoyed by all

Trail bridge named for tireless volunteer Wayne Sullivan

CANSO — What's in a name? That which we call a rose by any other name would smell just as sweet. Those lines from William Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet are interpreted as conveying the message that naming things is irrelevant.

That may be true in some cases, but not when it comes to a popular - and essential part of an attraction that draws people from near and far to this seaside community.

Sullivan's Bridge spans the water along the Chapel Gully Trail, which is developed and maintained by the Eastern Tips Trails Association (ETTA) - an organization made up of dedicated volunteers. One of the shining stars in that galaxy of contributors over the years - Wayne Sullivan - is the person honoured by that moniker.

"He is like a machine," Susan O'Handley - ETTA secretary - told The Journal.

Noting that Sullivan's hands-on contribution to building and maintaining the trail has saved the organization countless dollars, she said it is not an exaggeration to credit the local senior for doing 99 per cent of the "physical work" on the trails, such as spreading gravel and maintain the walkways, along with mowing, clearing, repairs and new builds

She added, "And, Wayne rarely asks for help," other than when something is too heavy or awkward for one person to move.

O'Handley noted that ETTA and the community are "eternally grateful" for his contributions.

"This would not be the #1 thing to do in Canso without Wavne's commitment and dedication," she said.

A sign emblazoned with 'Sullivan's Bridge' is the creation of a woodworker, part of a couple

"It couldn't have been more fitting," she said of having the bridge bear the diligent volunteer's name.

IN THE BEGINNING

Since it welcomed its first visitors to Wilmot St. in Canso in 1996, the ETTA has been "blessed with a core group" of volunteers that have been dedicated to fundraising,

of time "shadowing" officers and working with deckhands.

As summarized at nscc.ca/programs, mandatory sea time "provides students with the opportunity to put their skills and knowledge into practice," with the TC-required 360 sea days completed from April to August during their diploma studies.

Also, during those three years, students study the major principles of marine navigation, seamanship, meteorology, ship construction and stability, while preparing for a career as a ship's navigation officer.

To receive their NSCC diploma, cadets must maintain a 90 per cent attendance standard, while also achieving a pass mark of 70 in marine subjects and 60 in academic ones.

The marine navigation program prepares students for careers as ship navigation officers in the commercial marine industry, providing training in areas such as watch keeping practices seamanship, safety and communications.

It also provides the necessary academic and applied skills training to become an entry-level deck officer under International Maritime Organization standards.

RETURNING THE FAVOUR

Although he will continue a busy schedule fishing with his grandfather this summer, he told The Journal that has was taking some time to help host their German counterparts that were scheduled for arrive on May 27.

Keeping watch - when it came to collision avoidance - along with loading the ship were also mate-related tasks.

Myatt agreed that teamwork is a key component of the field.

"And, you have to learn how to lead a team," he noted.

Baxter noted that the German visitors will be treated to "big ship stuff" during their time at the Strait Area Campus, including time with the engine room simulators housed at the NSCC's marine institute. There will also be time spent in the fire school and at the wade pool.

There are also plenty of off-campus adventures planned.

'VERY BRIGHT FUTURE'

As for the future, Myatt - who has targeted the offshore as a place to launch his career - has high aspirations, including becoming a captain.

Nothing his student's

passion, Baxter said he has a "very bright future.

He added, "Brent can have the best of both worlds," of having the opportunity not only to work in the industry but also continue his beloved fishing with his grandfather.

Describing him as "incredibly mature and well-spoken," Baxter noted that Myatt represented himself, his program and school "extremely well.'

As for how his NSCC experience has been a key to helping reach his career goals. Myatt said. "I would recommend it to anybody.

He added, "It has been everything that I wanted.'


How Hydrogen is Made


Hydrogen is the most common element found in nature, but it is only over found combined with other elements. To produce pure hydrogen, you simply need to extract it from other compounds. Hydrogen can be extracted from hydrocarbons like coal or natural gas ("hydro" stands for hydrogen), but in doing so, carbon is released into the atmosphere (Grey Hydrogen).

HOW HYDROGEN IS PRODUCED TODAY

However, it is now possible to capture most of the carbon before going into the atmosphere and store it underground (Blue Hydrogen). Hydrogen can also be extracted from water (the "H" in "H2O" stands for hydrogen), using electricity (electrolysis). Once the hydrogen is extracted, the O2 (oxygen) is returned to the air. If the electricity used is from renewable sources (e.g. wind), you have green hydrogen.







Meteorological (MET) Tower

- MET Towers are temporary structures designed to collect weather-related information, such as wind speed, wind direction, and temperature.
- MET Towers are unassuming in the landscape. Each METBTower requires just a 100m buffer. Any impact on the surrounding area is minimal.
- MET Towers have a concrete base with guy-wires for support. The wires typically extend 60 metres in 3-4 directions from the tower.
- Each MET Tower has a permit application approved by the Government of Nova Scotia.
