Applying in 12 months or less:

Planning to pay for school

- Research your career/study plans. How much will your tuition, equipment, travel and living expenses be?
- ☐ What will your starting salary be in this career?
- ☐ Can a co-op program, internship, or apprenticeship help you "earn while you learn"?
- Which scholarships will you apply for? Scholarships are NOT just for students with top marks: don't ignore this valuable source of funding.
- How will your student loan payments compare to your expected salary?
- ☐ What other financing options do you have to pay for school? Do you have RESPs, pensions, or other family supports?
- How much of your summer earnings should you save? Will you get a job at school?
